### BRIGHT NEW OPERA COMPANY OF JUVENILES COMING SOON

The amusement loving public of Prince Rupert will be glad to hear that there arrived on the Prince George this morning Mr. Bert Lang, the manager of the Juvenile Bostonian Opera Co., who is in advance of his company to see to all preliminary arrangements, the company arriving on Saturday and opening that evening at the Westholme Opera house with the Irish musical play "The Rose of Blandeen." The juveniles are said to be extremely clever youngsters on the lines of the well-known Australian juvenile aggregation known as the Pollards who made such a big success on the Pacific Coast in the past. The Juvenile Bostonians, who have played the opera house, Vancouver, and the Metropolitan in Seattle, have just returned from a most successful engagement in Honolulu, where they took the Island city by storm. ### STRIKE IS CALLED FOR BY I.W.W. ORGANIZERS TO TAKE EFFECT LOCALLY TOMORROW

The up-line labor agitation has reached Prince Rupert, and a strike has been declared by the I. W. W. organizers affecting local labor on the drydock contract for excavation in the hands of Archie McDougall. It is announced that the men propose to meet the contractor or his agents with a view to conference regarding the situation.

Interviewed today Mr. McDougall remarked that as far as his men are concerned, he does not greatly apprehend any disaffection. Those who care to strike at the call of a handful of agitators, he declares, may lay off if they like. Those who wish to work will be amply protected.

Pat Welch is in the city, and it is understood that he has made arrangements for the prosecution of the various works in his firm's hands, strike or no strike. The feeling is that any attempt at labor disturbance will be speedily suppressed, and that the most of the men are ready to remain with the work.

### ENGLISH ROSES WIN THEIR FIRST PRINCE RUPERT LEAGUE FOOTBALL MATCH LAST NIGHT

The second league match under the Prince Rupert Football Association was played last night before about 500 spectators. The game started with the Roses having only seven players, but showed that the Caledonians were not going to have it all their own way. Hardy scored the first goal for the Roses. Soon after the Callies made a successful rush on the Roses' goal and Stewart equalized the score. The Rose fielded their eighth man five minutes before half time. Half time score, one goal each.

The second period opened much to the pleasure of one section of the crowd, the Rose players dominating the Callies' goal and once when the goalie was out the wavery was "Has anybody here seen Kelly?" ### MOTOR TRAIN TORPEDOES MAY BE USED SOME DAY ON G. T. P.

The Railway Commissioners of the Government-owned railways of New South Wales are thinking of introducing motor trains in the country districts of that state for the benefit of settlers in the newly settled districts, where there is not enough traffic to warrant ordinary passenger trains being run. These motor trains will replace the slow "mixed" trains, which at present have to cover both commercial and travelling requirements of these remote districts, for passenger transit. The motor trains will carry a limited number of passengers at the rate of 45 miles an hour. These cars cost between £6,000 and £7,000 each. Accommodation is provided for some 70 persons in one long car, about 70 feet long, which also includes the engine. The roof of the car is curved, and the head is shaped to a wind-cutting edge, so that the vehicle presents a torpedo-like appearance, the round port-holes accentuating the strangeness of the whole aspect of it as compared with what is usually seen on the steel track. The motor driving the car is of 200 horse-power, the cylinder holds 88 gallons of benzine, the oil consumption being about half a gallon per mile. Motor cars have now been in successful operation in the United States for some years, and they should prove of similar benefit in New South Wales.
