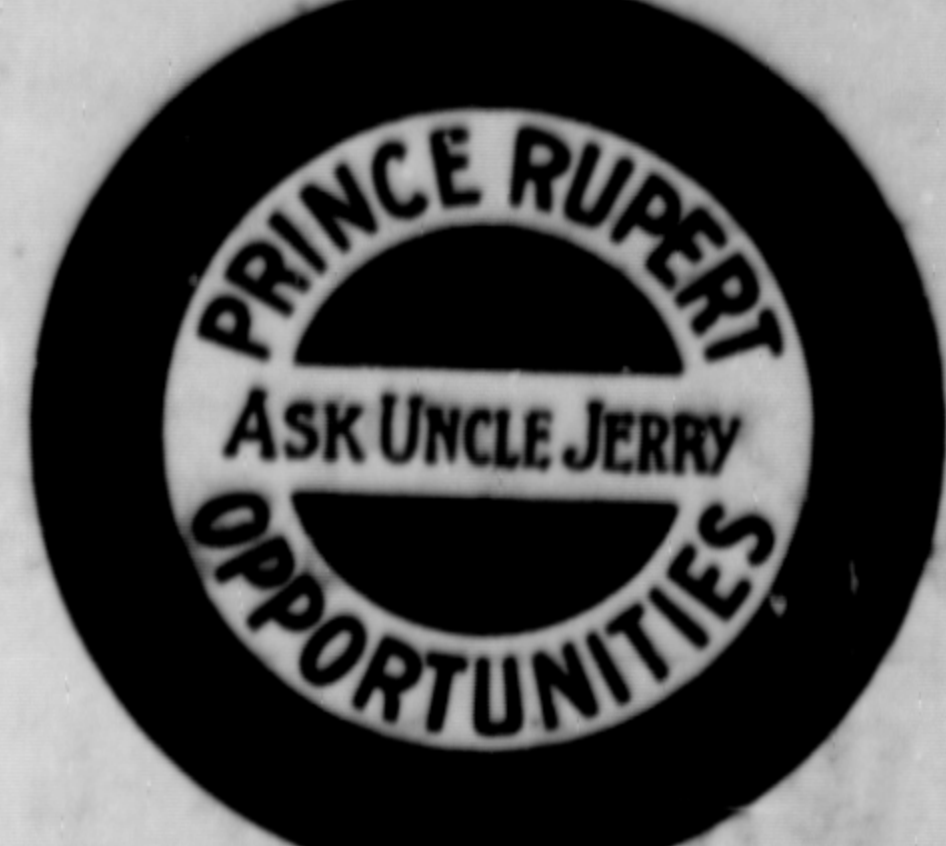

COMPLETE LIGHTNING LUNCH ON SLOT SYSTEM IN 30 SECONDS

The automatic luncheon, with a speed record of 30 seconds, is the newest "new thing" in New York.

The great American metropolis has long been noted for the number and speed of its quick-lunch places, yet the patrons, in their mad rush to save time and acquire dyspepsia, are still far from satisfied, and continually cry for quicker service. To meet this demand a syndicate from staid old Philadelphia, noted as the slowest town in the United York with a brilliant speed-lunch scheme. This newest device is a huge automatic luncheon-room located in the heart of the "latter palace" district, where the city's hungry can drop a coin in a slot and extract whatever creature comforts their appetite most fancies, from hash to peche Melba, without the loss of a second. The place is magnificently decorated and furnished, while the entire front is taken up with stained-glass windows that many a more pretentious structure might envy.

Dollar in the Slot
The big novelty of the place, which constitutes its chief attraction, is the automatic delivery of a full meal. On entering the place the customer passes down an aisle and inspects what he wants to eat before inserting the coin in the slot. The food lies

behind small plate-glass windows in steam-heated wall cabinets for hot dishes and ice-packed cabinets for cold dishes, the name and price of each dish being plainly printed on a card. Having made his choice, the customer slips in his coin and pulls out his hot mince pie, his lobster salad, or his ice cream, and begins a somewhat hazardous journey toward a vacant table, where he can bolt his food with whatever velocity he pleases.

No Arm Chairs There
The quality of the food is said to be above criticism, while the prices all range a little lower than those asked by most of the bath-tiled restaurants with women waiters, which have hitherto held the New York speed record in the eating line. The arm-chairs of these places, however, are lacking in the new establishment, the management having found by experience in Philadelphia that they are too comfortable to be profitable in a "food factory" where cannon-ball velocity is the great object.

The cost of building and equipping the new restaurant is said to have reached a very high figure, while the rental for the premises is fixed at \$10,000 a year. Still, the venture has proved so successful from the very start that the syndicate is now talking of invading London.

RUSSIAN PONIES FOR NOVA SCOTIA

Last winter the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company scoured the Maritime provinces and went even to the remotest parts of Newfoundland for ponies to work in the various collieries at Sydney Mines. While they were successful in procuring some that were suitable as pit horses the supply was insufficient. Now a shipment of ponies imported from Russia by that company has just arrived at Sydney. This is the first lot of these hardy little animals that has been taken to Cape Breton since the year 1885, to spend the remainder of their days down in the little underworld at Sydney Mines. Horse dealers in the British Isles should take note.

LONDON IS QUITE LIKE RUPERT

The county council proposes to advertise for a chief engineer to fill the position rendered vacant by the retirement of Sir Maurice Fitzmaurice. It is proposed to offer a salary of £2,000 a year.—London Standard.
