"A MAGNIFICENT SOUVENIR."

Referred to the Finance Committee last night was the application of a local artist of the lens and shutter to perpetuate in finished style photographically, the figures and physiognomies of the men who compose our present city council. The quaint part of it this morning is the announcement that just as the champion steps forward the strife is reported over.

THAT GOOD OLD GRIEVANCE.

An order has just been issued by Mr. Winston Churchill, as First Lord of the Admiralty, is that hereafter in the hymn sung at the launching of ships in the Royal Navy the word "Britain" shall be used, instead of "England." This action was taken as the result of formal representations made by the St. Andrew's Society of Scotland, and should tend to the increase of Mr. Churchill's popularity north of the Tweed.

HARRIS MINES RECENT SHAFT SINKING WORK

A recent report from Harris Mines gives the depth of the shaft on number three vein as 173 feet. There is a strong showing of the high grade copper ore which recently appeared in the shaft, and the management is greatly pleased.

On Monday another crew will begin sinking on the number one vein, on which a large body of good ore has been exposed by stripping and prospect pits.

THE B. C. PACKERS' FIGURES

The annual report of the British Columbia Packers' Association, being for the year ended June 30th last, shows the favorable operations of the year. The profits, after providing for depreciation, amounted to \$422,352.82, which, added to the balance carried forward, brought the amount at credit of profit and loss account up to \$921,951.74. From this dividends at the rate of 7 per cent, on the preferred stock and 6 per cent, on the common took \$161,632.50. There was put aside \$6,000 reserve to provide for losses on fishermen's account; \$108,788.97 was applied to redemption of 1,088 preferred shares, series "B," leaving a balance at credit of profit and loss to be carried forward of \$645,530.27.

The total assets of the company are set down at \$3,426,873.72, of which \$2,143,413.74 is real estate, buildings, canning and cold storage plants, brands, good will, etc.; \$164,979.13 the Packers' Steamship Company plant; \$7,000 the Numpkish hatchery, and the balance sundry debtors, salmon consigned on hand, insurance reserve and sundry advances. The capitalization on June 30th was \$1,511,400 in common and \$945,800 in preferred stock. The indebtedness amounted to \$301,322.99 due to banks and accounts payable.

SHE WORE FIG LEAVES JUST TWO

Oak Bluffs, Mass., Aug. 13.—This summer resort almost fell off the island yesterday when somebody spread a story that the titian-haired Countess Irmgard von Rottenhal had a new dance in which her costume consisted of two fig leaves and an apple, which appears to be true.

The countess, who dances at smart gatherings, has invented a dance called "The temptation of Eve." In this dance the countess carries a large apple. This is to represent the apple which made so much trouble in Eden. The countess' costume is in the shape of two fig leaves, but they are extra large leaves, large enough in fact, to clothe the dancer. However, it is whispered that the dance is so startling that it will never do for this quiet summer resort. The countess is going to try it on some other city first.
