VANCOUVER (CP)—

A vigorous young career politician who has yet to face his first election campaign as a political candidate today leads the Liberal party in British Columbia.

He is Ray Perrault, 33-year-old native of Vancouver who for the last year has been executive-secretary of the B.C. Liberal Federation and provincial party organizer.

He was elected leader at the party's provincial convention Saturday, succeeding Arthur Laing, 54, who stepped aside after six years in office.
