SUPPLYING SHORTAGE OF BINDER TWINE

The binder twine shortage is a thing of the past, for by the end of the week everything in the shape of orders or deficits in this line will be cleaned up. The Plymouth Cordage Company met the extraordinary demand in the best manner possible, and the solid through train containing 650,000 lbs. of the much required commodity, sufficient to bind the produce of 300,000 acres, and consigned to the company's local agent, Mr. McMahon, arrived in the city on Saturday at noon. That very night the shipment was sent for distribution to all points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The special train ran on a passenger schedule, with special right-of-way, leaving North Plymouth, Mass., last Wednesday afternoon at 3:45, and passing over the N.Y., N.H. and H., Boston and Maine, and Canadian Pacific railways. The train was delayed for a short time at Newport, due to certain customs formalities, but the C. P. R. officials lent valuable assistance, utilizing every means in their power to get the twine to Winnipeg on time. It arrived on Saturday at noon, so that the entire journey, generally one of two or three weeks, was made in a little less than 69 hours, and in the shortest possible time the supply has been made equal to the demand.

A snake five feet in length, which escaped from the Monarch Show when they appeared here a few weeks ago, showed up on the doorstep of Wesley Johnson's home, Napier street, St. Catherine's, the other evening. Mr. Johnson went in to get a gun, but a companion killed the reptile with a club while he was gone.

LIGHTNING SET THE BED ON FIRE

During Sunday night's severe electrical storm lightning entered the window of the home of William Johnstone, a farmer, on Concession nine, Alvington, Ont., and set fire to the clothing of a bed occupied by two of Mr. Johnstone's daughters.

HOUSE MAY NOT MEET TILL JANUARY

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—Speculation as to whether Parliament will open in November of in January is on the increase. While the members of the government themselves state that the matter will not be settled until after a full meeting of the cabinet, there is a growing belief that the government may not be able to get the sessional programme in readiness for November.

CLEARING GRANBY'S NEW TOWNSITE

Contract for clearing the new townsite at Granby Bay has been let to D. Kean of Prince Rupert, and he has a force of men working at it. A number of lots have been sold, and building is going ahead already on some of them. The owners of the townsite will probably let the contract for a new wharf there within a few days.

TORPEDO IS WEAPON OF THE FUTURE

The torpedo armament of the new British warships is to be increased. With the exception of the Dreadnought and three of the Invincibles, which have five tubes each, all the vessels of the Dreadnought class now have three and the battle cruisers two. It has been proposed to provide five torpedo tubes to the ships of the 1911 programme, while the torpedo armament of the destroyers is being increased from two tubes to four.

The reason for the increases is that torpedoes of the latest types have a range almost equal to that of a gun. Ten thousand yards is regarded as quite a practicable distance for the British Hardecastle torpedo. As a torpedo carries a much more damaging charge than a shell, and strikes a vessel in its most vital part, great attention has been paid to its development.

German Dreadnought battle-ships carry six tubes each, and battl cruisers four. The Japanese battle cruiser Kongo, now building at Barrow, will have eight tubes.

TO RID THE WHOLE WORLD OF FLIES

A practically flyless world is promised by C. T. Switzer, of Newton, if all garbage pails are equipped with an oiled bag which he has invented to be placed within refuse cans. The idea is patentable, according to the inventor, but he "hates flies so himself" he is willing to let the world know about it.

Boston health department officials and those of a dozen surrounding small cities and towns, gathered in a Back Bay alley today to watch the collection of garbage from cans filled with the oiled bags two days ago. Switzer pointed out millions of egg deposits, the eggs being "dead" from oil fumes.
