Juneau, Alaska, Sept. 9.—John Shuttack, 21 years old, student at the University of Oregon; Dell Linscott, age 20, a resident of Douglas, and Leslie Oliver, 17 years old, of Juneau, are believed to have perished in the mountains back of Sheep Creek, four miles south of here, having be-

come lost in the fog while hunting. Parties of woodsmen and Indians who have been searching within a radius of twenty miles have been unable to find any trace of the boys, who set out from Juneau Thursday morning expecting to return the same day.

VICTORIA SAILING YACHT IS VERY LONG OVERDUE

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—Masters of vessels sailing north from his port today, have been asked to keep close watch for a thirty-five foot yacht, "Drift," overdue here from Victoria. The "Drift" left Victoria on August 25 with

three British Columbia sportsmen whose names could not be learned here, on board. The boat is without power and it is feared that rough weather which has caused trouble to coastwise vessels in the last few weeks may have been fatal to the craft.

MOTOR CYCLIST CUTS WIDE SWATHE OF DEATH IN CROWD

Newark, N.Y., Sept. 9.—Edie Hasha, of Waco, Texas, holder of several world's records for motor cycle racing, plunged over the rail of the course at the Newark Motordrome into the crowd yesterday, causing the death of six persons, including himself,

NEW 35-MILE AUTOMOBILE ROAD IN PARK

In order to make the way of the tourist easier in Glacier National Park, the Great Northern railway secured permission from the government to construct, at its own expense, an automobile road 35 miles long from Glacier Park station, the eastern gateway to Glacier National Park, on the main line of the railway, through the foothills of the Rockies along the border of the Blackfeet Indian Reservation and the park to St. Mary's Lake. The work has just been completed and the railway company has established a one-day automobile tour between these two points.
