## CANADA'S CRACK CORINTHIAN IS CAPT. NORMAN GOODERHAM OF THE CUP WINNER PATRICIA

A YACHT RACING STORY THAT WILL APPEAL TO PRINCE RUPERT'S POPULAR POSTMASTER AND SOME OF OUR GOOD-NATURED BANK BOYS.

Canadian oarsmen and sailors on the Great Lakes have covered themselves with glory this summer. While they did not do as well as they might have done in England, our oarsmen showed the Americans a few tricks at the Canadian Henley, and our sailors in the two international yacht races. The Patricia's success against the Michigan in Lake Michigan was brilliant. It brought out the fact that the city of Toronto could produce an amateur skipper so shrewd that not all the skippers in the great city of Chicago, in a craft which was as fast, if not faster, than the Toronto boat, could outmanoeuvre him. Norman Gooderham's reputation is established by his skill at the finish of the third race in the series. A whimsical wind made the finish a case of brains. The Michigan and the Patricia swept down toward the finishing line side by side, with the American ten feet ahead. The Chicagoans were getting ready to cheer. They could not conceive of the Patricia getting by the Michigan without fouling her. But suddenly the Patricia's mainsail was gybed over and the spinnaker whipped over on the other side. The Canadian's big mainsail blanketed the American and stopped her way, and Gooderham swung the Patricia by without fouling, and went to the front. Even then the Michigan tried to catch up, and would have caught up had the Toronto skipper made his move ten seconds earlier. Ten seconds later would have been just as wrong. This was up to the best traditions of Canadian yachting.—Canadian Colliers.
