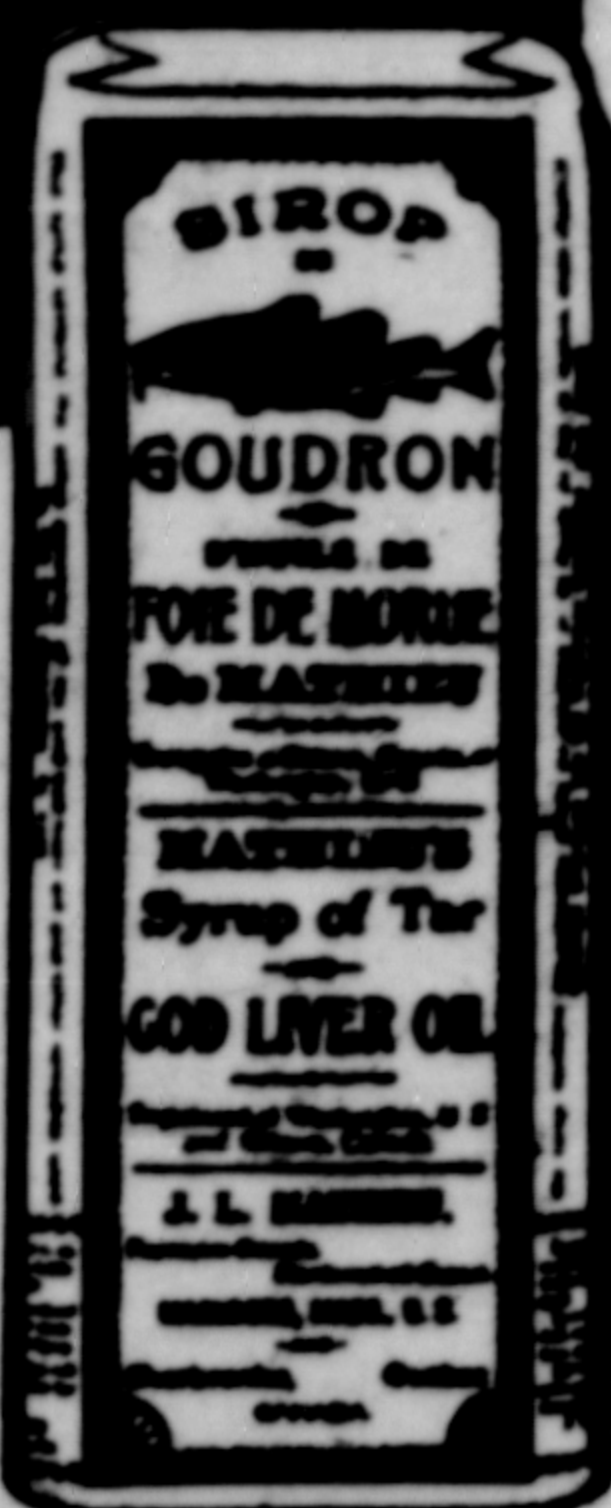

At the Theatre

Audience at the Westholme Again Entertained by the Allen Players—This Time in "Merely Mary Ann."

The Allen Players at the Westholme Opera House last evening presented that most delightful of comedies, "Merely Mary Ann," the work of one of the greatest of English contemporary dramatists, Israel Zangwill. From the moment that the curtain went up the audience were captured, and the play went through with snap and vim. The play, dealing with the life of a little orphan lodging house slave, wrenched from the happy country life of the peaceful English village and at an early age introduced to the sordid surroundings of life in a cheap London lodging house, at the beck and call of the various lodgers, was a perfect picture. Miss Verna Felton in the leading part of "Merely Mary Ann" captivated the audience from the moment she appeared on the stage, showing that marked versatility as an actress in her power to portray such a widely different character from that of "Zaza," the music hall artiste, in which she achieved such a triumph the evening before, which has established her as one of the leading young actresses of the west today. Mr. George Zucco, the leading man, in the part of Launcelot, the embryo musical composer, struggling against adverse fate and the obtuseness of musical publishers, was excellent, and his scenes with "Merely Mary Ann," the little slavey, who falls desperately in love with her magnificent "lion," held the attention of the audience every moment they were upon the stage. Mrs. P. R. Allen as the London lodging house keeper, with her multifarious troubles, combining the bringing up of her daughter as a young lady and the attending needs of her several lodgers, some of whom certainly required watching, was to the manner born and presented as fine a piece of character acting as could be seen on any stage. Mr. Byron Eagan as Mr. Peters, Launcelot's old time college chum and now prosperous business man, gave a breezy and finished rendering of the part, whilst Miss Etta Farnsworth as the old lodging house keeper's daughter Rosie, destined to become a fine lady, played a small part capably, being a splendid foil to the slatternly little slavey, "Merely Mary Ann." Space forbids a more extended notice of the several other characters, which were all ably sustained by the clever cast, the whole play being a perfect picture of a phase of modern life, staged and produced in a fashion never so far attempted in a Prince Rupert theatre. Special mention must be made of the two songs charmingly rendered by Miss Gladys Hudars during an inter-act, which were received with rounds of applause. The Hungarian orchestra again rendered delightful music of an uncommon kind that has a distinct charm and seems to grow on one; nor must one forget a very important member of the cast drawn from the amateur ranks—Dick, the canary—who made a great hit, not being a bit nervous and perfect in his words.

ELECTRICAL CURRENT IS NEW FOOD

If a man is hungry, give him electricity. If he asks for bread or beefsteak, put him in an electric chair and turn on the current.

This paradoxical method is recommended by Professor Bergonie, of Bordeaux, who has just been telling his medical colleagues at a course at Nimes for the advancement of science of the curious results of his experiment. According to the professor, food can be replaced by electricity as nourishment for the human system. Low tension and high frequency electric currents (that is, such currents as one gets from an induction coil or from the instruments often seen at fairs, which are used to pass currents through persons holding the terminals) passing through the body, he says, have the same effect in producing interior warmth as meat and bread, with this advantage over food, that they do not tax the digestive organs.

These currents can be employed, he claims, without the slightest deleterious effect. Professor Bergonie says his treatment will prove invaluable in cases of invalids, who will be able to assimilate energy in electric form. "In many cases I have observed that my electrical treatment led to a notable increase in weight."
