BRITAIN TO BUILD MOST POWERFUL OF WARSHIPS

The most powerful battleship yet ordered is to be laid down at Portsmouth in November by the British Admiralty.

She is to be 700 feet in length and is to displace 30,000 tons, while her high-powered turbine engines are to develop a speed of 29 knots.

It is reported that the new vessel is to be armed with 14-inch guns, the first tried in the British navy.
