two deaths. The general health of the city was reported good.

A communication was received and read from Mr. S. Massey, in which he stated that he could not entertain the offer of the position of superintendent of the Electric Light department in the place of Mr. Love, resigned, unless he receive the same salary as the previous occupant of the position. The matter was referred to the committee of the Light and Telephone department.

The thanks of the Council was tendered to Mr. George Frizzell for his kindness and courtesy in putting his motor car at the disposal of the city during the two days of the visit of H. R. H. the Governor General.

The question, brought up by his worship Mayor Newton, as to the selling of the city's debentures provoked considerable discussion, in which Alderman Morrissey and Clayton figured prominently, as did also City Solicitor Peters.

From the Electric Light and Power department came a report that caused considerable anxious discussion. It was that, owing to the strike in the Vancouver Island collieries, the coal contractors could not guarantee to fill their contract with the City Lighting department. The supply on hand was very limited, and unless a sufficient amount of coal could be secured the plant might have to shut down.

Realizing the importance of the situation, His Worship and the aldermen discussed thoroughly measures to be taken in the event of the contractors failing to supply the electric light bunkers.

Finally, it was ordered that the city purchasing agent ascertain where coal could be secured and at what price.

Alderman Montgomery took exception to a remark made last week by Alderman Clayton regarding his conduct and demanded proof of the assertion of a

withdrawal of the charge, but Alderman Clayton refused to do either until he has received a report from the Police Commission.

PARLIAMENT TO OPEN NOVEMBER
