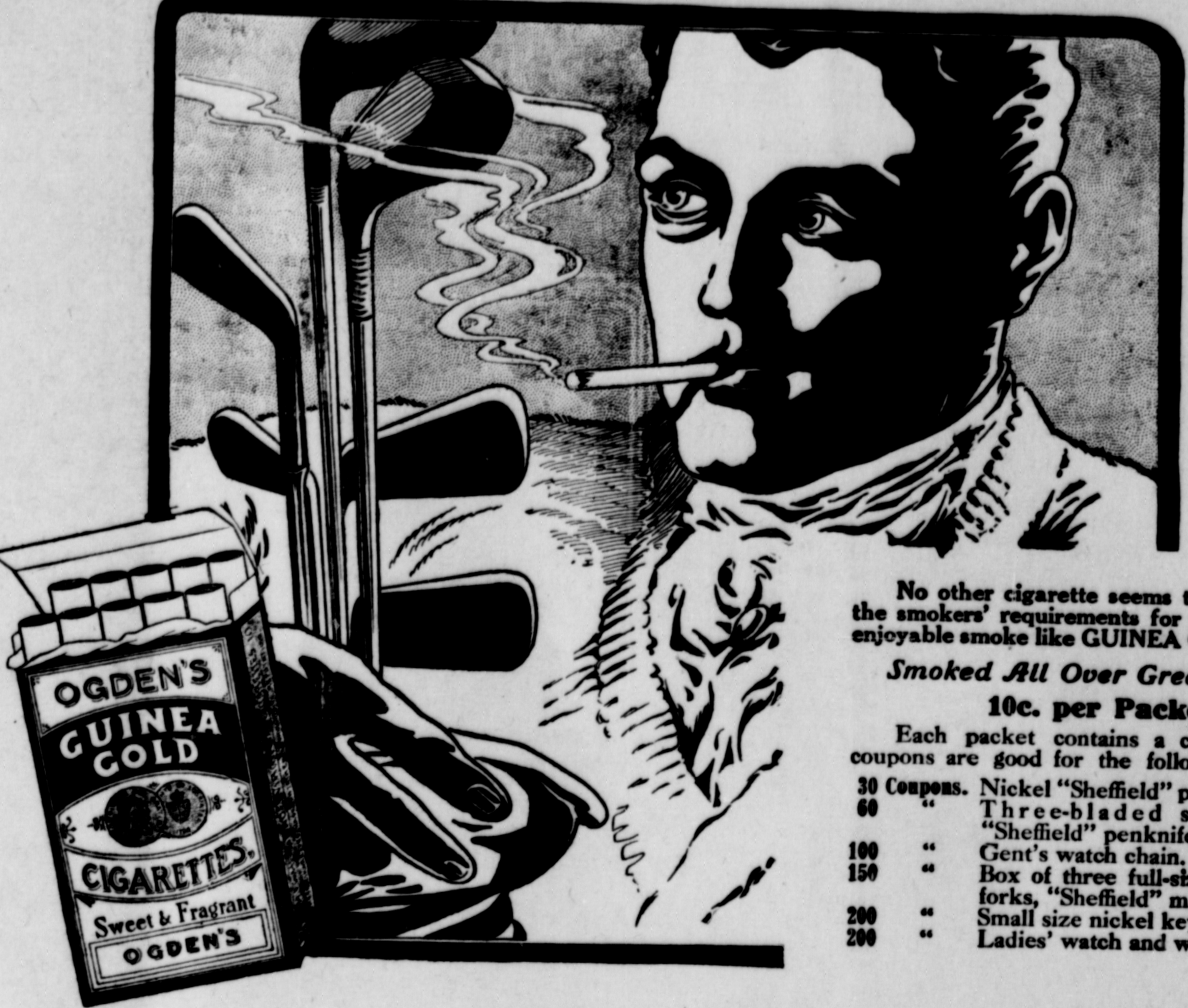

EXPERTS EXAMINE THE GROUNDHOG PROPERTY

ENGINEERS TO EXAMINE COAL FIELDS ARRIVE AT HAZELTON—LARGE AREA COVERED BY THE WORK ALREADY DONE.

The Groundhog coal field has been much in the limelight throughout the season. Much has been said and written of the great coal measures of the north district, and now, it is to be hoped, those interested in the measures and the people of the province generally will soon learn from authoritative sources what the future prospects of the district are. In addition to the prospecting and development work which has been prosecuted during the summer by the Amalgamated, the B. C. Anthracite Coal and other big concerns, there has been a thorough examination of the field from geological and economic standpoints. G. S. Malloch, of the Dominion geological survey, has continued his work, covering the newer portions of the coal area. William Fleet Robertson, Provincial mineralogist, has inspected the field in behalf of the Provincial Department of Mines, and two parties of engineers, acting for the Vancouver capitalists who have invested so heavily in the district, have been engaged in experting the coal measures. Messrs. G. W. Evans and Gustav Grossman, assisted by Messrs. H. E. Taylor and G. N. Lowenthal respectively, have examined 335 claims on the Skeena, Stikine and Klapan slopes for the Amalgamated Groundhog Anthracite Coal Syndicate of Vancouver. These claims were staked by "Groundhog" Jackson, Bob Macdonald, A. E. Falconer, H. Corner and Thomas Hankin. Mr. Evans also examined the B. C. Anthracite Company's property, situated on the upper reaches of the Skeena in the vicinity of Trail, Currier, Jackson, Teifer and Langlois creeks. This property adjoins the claims held by Mr. McAvoy. The engineers are expected to arrive in Hazelton this evening. While local men interested in various parts of the big coal field are quite naturally anxious to learn the character of the reports which will be presented, it is not to be expected that anything will be made public until after the experts have reported to their clients, the owners of the groups on which they conducted their examinations. The party, consisting of 22 men, has enjoyed the finest of weather, the climate being identical with that which has been experienced around Hazelton. It will be no especial treat for the boys to get fresh meat in town, as cariboo and goat meat has been plentiful and at times when the larder was shy a feed of "whistler" could always be procured.—Omineca Miner.

SOCCER NOTES OF OLD LAND

Reid of Airdrieonians scored all three goals against Motherwell in the Lanarkshire cup tie at Fir Park. The Bloomfield men were in fine form and thoroughly deserved their victory. Thomson and Cloverdale, of Genclair, are this year assisting Sunderland. Mr. D. McEwan is no longer a Dundee football club director. He was among the unsuccessful candidates. Airdrieonians are at present negotiating with Conlin, the ex-Manchester City and International player. James Gail is to be Hume's understudy at Pittodrie this season. He went to England, but has been out of football for two years. Previous to going to England he was a regular player for the Aberdeen "A" team. In the majority of matches in which Glasgow Rangers were defeated by 2-1 last year, Billy Hogg scored the goal. Clyde cronies are all confident that they are to go one better this season than last—that is, they are to win both the cup and the league. Hughie Simpson, of Raith Rovers, and Robert Bonthron, the Birmingham back who was transferred to Airdrieonians last year, are playing for the Leigh Club this season. Between these seasoned players and a clever goalkeeper, who has recently signed for them, the "Zebras" look like having a really strong defense. Bill Duncan, the St. Mirren custodian, and the directors of the club are split as to terms. "Tis a pity, for Willie saved them many times last season. Thomas Wilson, who played centre half for the Hearts, has been transferred to Luton. Wilson went to the Hearts from Middlesbrough. An old Edinburgh favorite has been killed in a train wreck near Buffalo, in the person of John Tait, who played for the Hearts in 1902. Bobby Templeman is to stay on at Kilmarnock another season. Killie could not do without Robert. Kilmarnock will be a force to reckon with this season. The Queens Park evidently believe in Maes. No less than three McKenzies appear in their team's playing list this year. Sheffield Wednesday's team for this season has as usual been

built on solid, substantial and thick lines, any one member of which is said to be able to squash anything on two legs. It remains to be seen if it can squash the ball into the net or not. "Longshanks" Edie and Kelso, of Manchester City, are to have a benefit this season. They deserve it. Except that Beal will defend the uprights, Manchester United will play the same team this season as last.
