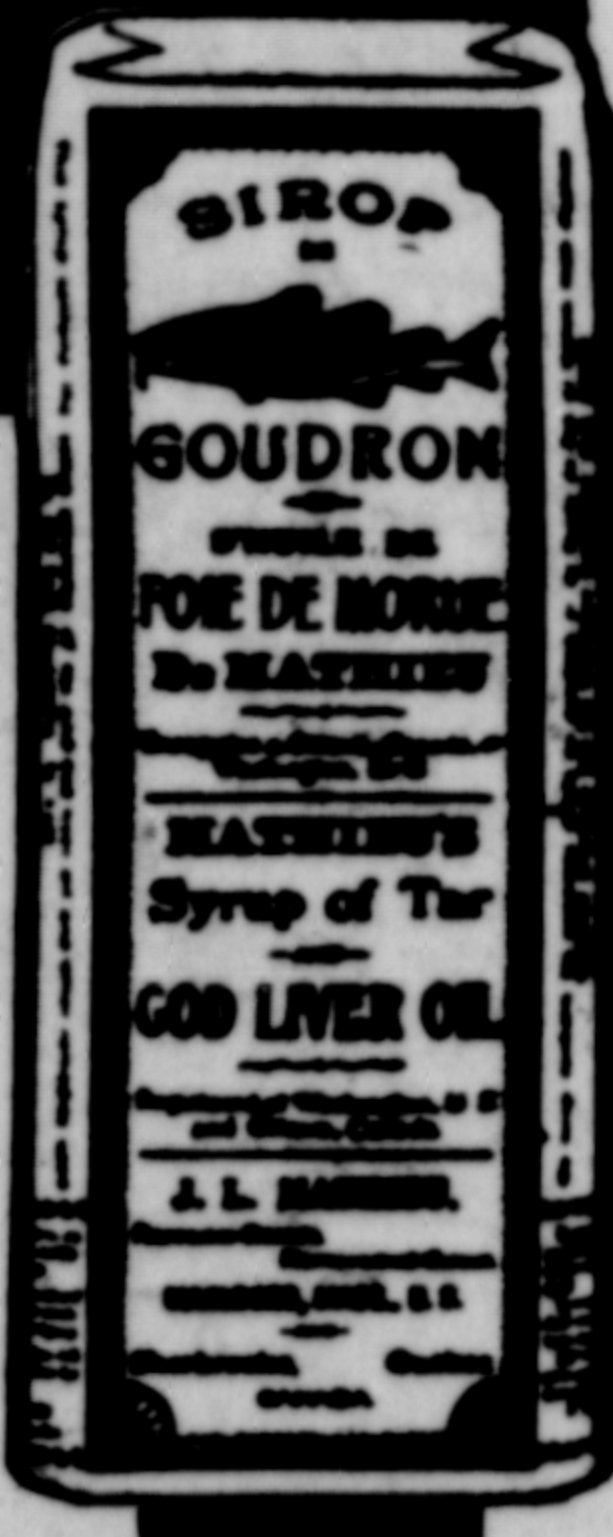

Made to Measure

Conditions Power Co. Offered to City

(Continued from Page 1.)

by the company other than poles belonging to the corporation ten (10) cents per pole per annum, and for each and every pole belonging to the corporation used by the company for the carrying of any wire or wires, five (5) cents per pole per annum.

(2) In each and every calendar year from the year 1923 to the year 1933, both inclusive, for each and every pole erected, maintained, kept or used by the company, other than poles belonging to the corporation twenty-five (25) cents per pole per annum, and for each and every pole belonging to the corporation used by the company for carrying of any wire or wires twelve and one-half (12½) cents per pole per annum.

(3) In each and every calendar year from and including the year 1933 to the end of the full term of forty years, as herein provided for, for each and every pole erected, maintained, kept or used by the company other than poles belonging to the corporation, fifty (50) cents per pole per annum, and for each and every pole belonging to the corporation used by the company for the carrying of any wire or wires twenty-five cents per pole per annum; and the above payments shall be made by the company during the month of December in each year upon the poles actually erected, kept, maintained or used by the company, on the first day of October in such year.

(5) The permission hereby granted by the corporation to the company to construct, erect and maintain poles and conduits, and string and operate wires and cables along the sides and across or under any public highway or bridge within the limits of the corporation shall be subject to the following conditions, viz:

And then in subsections a, b, c, d, e, f, g, h and i, which follow the conditions to be observed by the corporation and company in regard to the erection of poles and lines.

Subsection "a" gives height and condition of timber to be used in the poles and cross arms.

(b) Provides for the safety of life and limb during the work of erecting and repairing the lines;

(c) Binds the company to file plans with the city previous to the commencement of any work within the city and also specifications of the materials to be used.

(d) Provides that the poles shall not be used for any other purpose than that agreed upon.

(e) Stipulates the conditions in regard to carrying a greater voltage than 2,500 volts.

(f) Mentions that proper precautions must be taken by the company to protect life.

(g, h and i) Stipulates what measures must be taken for the mending of streets and lanes torn up by the company in their work; the protection of shade trees, and the removal of the company's lines and poles if necessary to carry out civic improvements.

Subsection "j" is more important and is stated:

(j) The rates for power to be charged by the company shall be subject to the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, but the company shall sell electrical energy to the corporation of the City of Prince Rupert at the following rates:

(1) Charge for maximum demand:

One dollar per maximum electrical horse power per month; to be charged for the greatest rate of power used during the month averaged over a period of one hour. This rate shall be determined by test as follows:

The authorized representatives of the company and the corporation shall measure the maximum energy used by the corporation, for this purpose taking hourly readings with standard watt-hour meters for twenty-four (24) hours (or less, if mutually agreed upon), and the maximum energy thereby indicated for any one hour shall be taken as the maximum load. Such tests shall be taken at least once every thirty (30) days on such day or days in each month as may be specified from time to time by the company. For the purposes of this agreement a horse power or electrical horse power, wherever mentioned, shall be considered as equivalent to seven hundred forty-six (746) watts.

(2) Charge for kilowatt hours used:

An additional energy charge

for loads having a maximum of less than one thousand (1,000) kilowatts (as measured by the above described method) of one cent per kilowatt hour; and for loads having a maximum of one thousand (1,000) kilowatts or over, of three-quarters of a cent per kilowatt hour.

(k) Electric current bought by the corporation from the company under the terms set forth in paragraph "j" above, may be sold by the corporation to any consumer for lighting and heating purposes, and for power purposes to consumers having a connected load with a rating equivalent to over ten (10) horse power.

6. The company shall and will from time to time and at all times indemnify and save harmless the corporation from any injury arising from any casualty or accident to person or property by reason of any neglect or omission to keep the poles and wires of the company in a safe condition, and from all valid claims against the corporation for damages caused by said wires or poles, or by any works, alterations, repairs or improvements in connection with the work herein contemplated.

7. The privileges hereby granted to the company shall absolutely cease and determine after the expiration of two years from the date hereof, unless prior to the expiration of such term of two years the company shall have so completed their work as to be ready to commence delivering electrical energy and power within the City of Prince Rupert, B. C.

8. That nothing in this bylaw contained shall be deemed to confer or be construed as conferring any exclusive right or powers on or to the said company.

NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT WEST

G.T.P. Entrance at Brandon

Brandon, Man., Oct. 4.—According to local observers a marked movement in real estate circles in Brandon has now set in. During the past few days, it is pointed out, a number of important deals have been recorded for property in the south and west ends of the city. Another notable transaction involved about 50 lots in the vicinity of the normal school. Recently published statements to the effect that the G.T.P. is acquiring options with a view to entering the city from the west are noted in connection with these deals.

Many Lives as a Cat.

Moosejaw, Oct. 4.—While working on a threshing outfit 40 miles south of Morse, a home-steader named Montgomery was run over by the engine and received a dreadful laceration inside the thigh. The driver of the engine, after passing over him, became excited, backed up and went over the victim again. The cries of the man made the driver think he was approaching him and he reversed, coming up to the victim for the third time. By an extraordinary effort Montgomery managed to crawl clear. He lay for three days at a farm suffering badly, and was taken over the trail to Morse and shipped here. At the hospital three doctors have him in hand and hope to save his life.

Calgary, Oct. 2.—Reports from all districts of Alberta show cutting this crop to be practically complete. Threshing will be general by the middle of this week. Both yield and grade are very satisfactory.

Regina Rebekahs won the world's prize contests in the Odd Fellows' convention, Winnipeg.

Edmonton, Oct. 4.—The contract has been awarded for a new building for a tannery, shoe and leather company, to cost \$25,000.

Lethbridge, Oct. 4.—Work has been commenced on the new Dominion government building, to cost \$221,000.
