

## TURKISH PEOPLE SCREAM CURSES AT ENEMIES

### ONE THOUSAND RUSSIAN FARMERS WILL SETTLE IN DISTRICT BEHIND PRINCE RUPERT

#### TURKS SCREAM "CURSED BE BULGARIA, GREECE AND MONTENEGRO" AT MEETING

Thousands of Turks at Great Meeting Curse Their Enemies--- Turkey Can Meet All Her Foes, Say Leaders ---Germany is Pessimistic

(Special to Daily News.) Constantinople, Oct. 5.—Sentiment in favor of the impending war is increasing in Turkey. Thousands of men gathered at a great mass meeting held in a mosque yesterday and whenever reference was made to the Balkan states it was greeted with shouts

of "Cursed be Bulgaria, Greece and Montenegro." Several Liberal leaders declared that Turkey was ready to face all her foes.

Paris, Oct. 5.—Expectations for the maintenance of peace between the Balkan states and Turkey was strengthened today by assurance given by the French

government that Austria-Hungary was ready to join any concerted action of the powers to prevent hostilities.

Berlin, Oct. 5.—The German foreign office and the government newspapers continue pessimistic in connection with an outbreak of hostilities in the Balkans.

#### WEATHER WORTH FIVE MILLIONS PER DAY TO PRAIRIE FARMERS

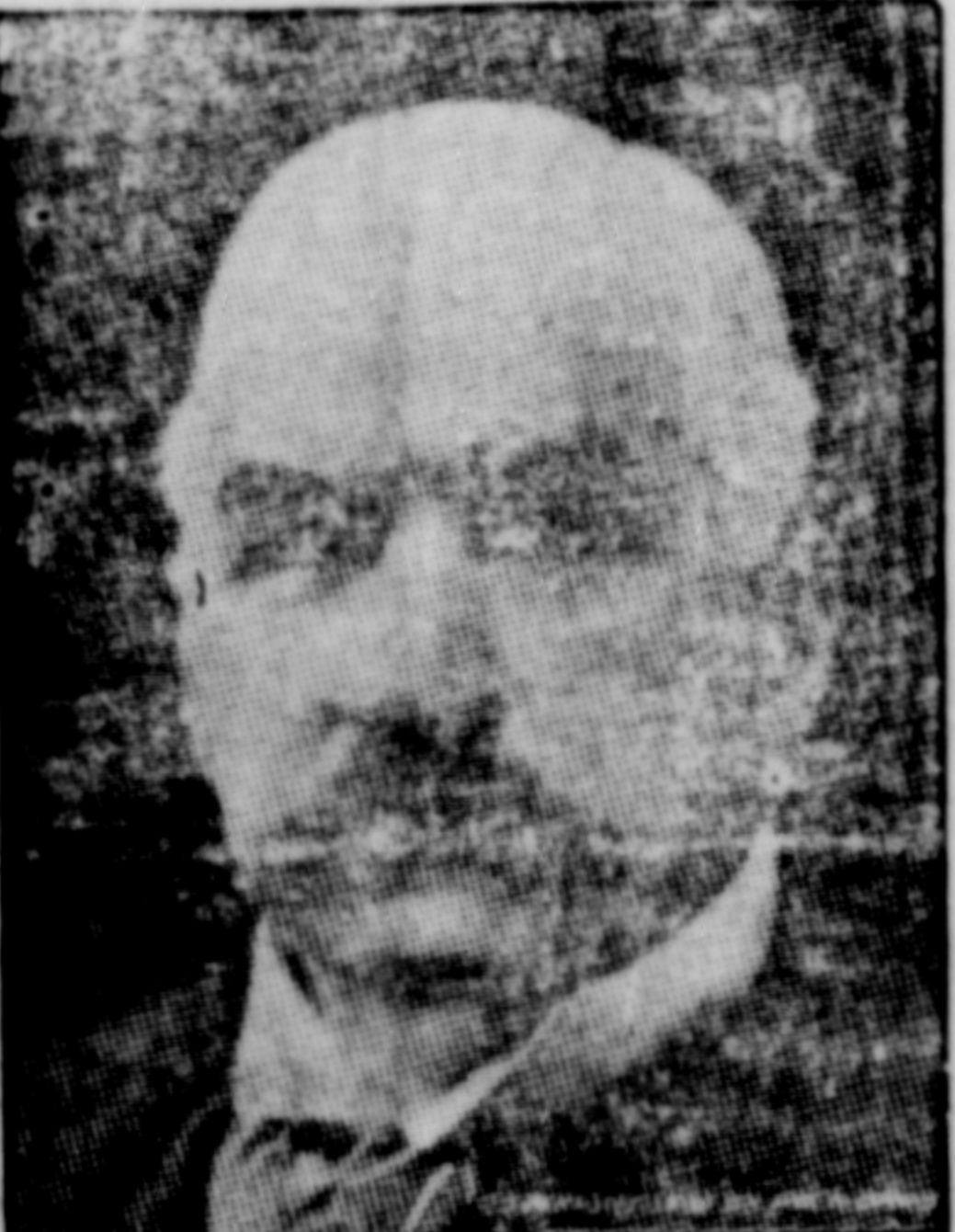
Despatches Say That Nicaraguan Government Troops Captured Town of Massays.

#### ONE THOUSAND FARMERS TO SETTLE IN DISTRICT BEHIND PRINCE RUPERT

Leader of Gigantic Colonization Scheme is in the City---First of Settlers Will Arrive Within Thirty Days to Build Houses for Families

That two hundred families, aggregating nearly a thousand persons will arrive with the first signs of spring to settle in the neighborhood of Hazelton and Morristown and engage in farming was the statement made yesterday by Mr. A. M. Asanchev, who arrived in the city this week in connection with a gigantic

colonization scheme for Northern British Columbia.

The new colony, which will be operated on the co-operative plan, will be composed entirely of Russian farmers, men of superior ability and attainments who are experienced agriculturists.

Two sections of land, each four thousand acres in extent, have been obtained by Mr. Asanche-

v's company. This is subdivided into forty acre blocks and is sold to the colonists at a very reasonable figure on exceptionally easy terms. Stock, implements and everything necessary to commence active operations for the cultivation of the land is provided by the company on the

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#### HOSPITAL BOARD HAVE BUSY SESSION; IMPORTANT MATTERS

LADIES' AUXILIARY HAVE TROUBLE OVER FUNDS SECURED AT CONCERT—CONTRACTOR AWAITS BOND TO FINISH WORK.

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Hospital Board was held yesterday afternoon at the city hall with a full attendance of members. A communication was read from the City Council stating that a draft in their favor of the hospital for \$5,000 would be accepted. A letter was also read from the Mack Realty Co. in regard to the matter of securing the hospital insurance. This was referred to the finance committee. Following this business, the board entered into a lengthy debate as to the proper course to take as to the disposition of the monies received as the result of the charity performance given in aid of the hospital during the visit of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

It appears that the idea of giving the concert for the hospital and getting the promise of the royal patronage was entirely the inspiration of the Ladies' Auxiliary, the funds, it was understood, to go to the establishment of a special ward to be named "Connaught Ward." The work of getting up and arranging the concert seems to have developed entirely upon Mrs. W. E. Burritt and Mrs. N. M. McNeill, to whom every credit is due for its success, and the amount of money obtained.

These two ladies, being in possession of the funds without having any further communication with the Ladies' Auxiliary, handed a cheque for the amount, some \$620, over to the Hospital Board.

The Ladies' Auxiliary consider this entirely out of order, as the concert was given under their auspices, and wrote asking the

board to hand the money over to them for their disposition.

After considerable discussion, it was decided that the money be handed over to the Ladies' Auxiliary, with the provision that it be used for the purpose of furnishing the Connaught ward.

Matron McTavish's report was next taken up, dealing with her request for the appointment of four probationers before the first of January. Of the two that an endeavor had been made to secure, one had been unable to leave her home in Portland and the other, who arrived here, only remained for a short while. It was decided to advertise for four probationers. Before the meeting closed the subject of E. J. Hicks and his contract for the erection of the new Connaught wing came up for discussion. It appears that delay in securing a bond from the contractor prevents payments being made to him.

#### ROYAL CITY IS PORT OF BOATS

Marine Returns Indicate That New Westminster Is Registered Port of Many Small Boats.

New Westminster, Oct. 5.—The report of the Minister of Marine on the shipping of the Dominion credits the port of New Westminster with a registration of 206 sailing ships and steamers, and 128 steamers out of 1227 sailing ships and steamers and 873 steamers registered in the province of British Columbia. The greater number of these vessels probably consist of tugs, but though their tonnage is small the amount of business done by them in towing huge booms up the fresh water river is enormous and the value of this traffic can hardly be estimated.

Babine Lake Property Has Rich Body of Ore Which Took First Prize at the Exhibition.

A property which has attracted a good deal of attention of late is the Silver Island in Babine lake. George Neilson and J. W. Power, of Vancouver, directors of the company operating the property, are in Hazelton today, on their way with additional men for the mining crew, which will be kept working throughout the winter. Ore from this property won the first prize at the recent Vancouver fair. Considerable ore is being prepared for shipment, Mr. Neilson says, and the provincial government will be asked to construct a wagon road from Babine lake to the railway, at Decker Lake, a distance of fifteen miles. The proposed road will be of great benefit to settlers in the Babine district, as well as to those who are developing mining properties.—Omineca Miner.

#### AMERICAN BOY WILL SHIP ORE

Carload of Ore from American Boy Is Awaiting the Arrival of Steel at Hazelton.

Two well known up river mining men left on this morning's train for Hazelton—Messrs. J. L. Bagg and W. D. Harris. The latter, who is known in most mining circles on the Pacific Coast as "Duke Harris," is managing director of the American Boy, a property located about seven miles from Hazelton, that bids fair in the almost immediate future to become a shipping mine that will be known all over B. C. and the Pacific Coast generally.

At the present moment there is a full carload of ore that has every pound been packed out from the mine, lying at Hazelton awaiting the arrival of the steel rails to transport it down to the Trail smelter. This will be the first regular shipment of ore ever made from the interior, and will consist of nearly thirty tons. The announcement of the returns will be awaited with the greatest of interest.
