WAR HAS COMMENCED

BOSTON BEATS NEW YORK ON HOME GROUNDS IN FIRST GAME OF THE WORLD SERIES

SEVERAL NEW STORES ARE BEING RAPIDLY COMPLETED

BATTLE FOUGHT WITH TURKS; PATRIOTS ARE LEAVING B.C.

(Special to Daily News.)

Paris, Oct. 8---War has been declared in the Balkans by Montenegro and a move has been made by the principality against Turkey. Troops are already pouring across the frontier and it is hourly expected that the other states involved will declare open hostilities and proceed against the Ottoman.

Already the Turks and Montenegrins have met in battle on the Turkish side of the frontier and although it is known that a large number of men were involved in a desperate struggle, no definite word of the outcome or the casualties has been received.

The foreign office has been informed of the fact that the Montenegrin charge d'affairs at Constantinople asked for and was granted his passports, and has withdrawn from Turkey.

NEW LINERS ARE MODELS OF SPEED, SAFETY AND COMFORT

OFFICIAL OF THE C. P. R. STATES THAT THE NEW TRANS-PACIFIC LINERS TO BE COMMISSIONED ARE THE VERY BEST.

In speaking of the two new steamships, the Empress of Russia and the Empress of Asia, which the Canadian Pacific Railway is building for service on the Pacific Ocean between Canada and the Orient, a C. P. R. official remarked a few days ago that he felt justified in saying that the two new boats would be the safest vessels afloat.

Ordinarily, if a ship is designed to float with only two compartments flooded, a sufficient margin of safety is thought to have been allowed, but in the cases of the new Empress of Russia and the Empress of Asia, should four compartments be flooded they will still float.

ALD. MORRISSEY WON'T GIVE IT

Refuses to Deposit Money for Security of Light—Matter of Principle.

Alderman Morrissey at the last meeting of the City Council protested vigorously against the cutting off of power and light users who had failed to comply with the rule laid down by the Council that all users of current should deposit a sum equal to six months' rates with the city as a guarantee that they would pay their light bills.

London, Oct. 8. — Although every belief is put in the rumor that Montenegro has declared war against Turkey and has already thrown troops across the frontier, no official notification of the trouble has been issued by the foreign office.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 9.—Greeks, Montenegrins, Servians, Roumanians and Bulgarians are pouring into the city from the construction camps throughout the State of Washington in readiness to proceed at once to the seat of war.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 8.—The different colonies here of the peoples of the different Balkan nations are very much excited over the declared war by Montenegro, and already several hundred are preparing to leave for their home lands, while several thousand will follow in a few weeks.
