

TURKS ARE DEFEATED

TURKS DEFEATED IN BATTLE BY MONTENEGRINS YESTERDAY

PRINCE PETER OF MONTENEGRO FIRED FIRST SHOT AS SIGNAL FOR GENERAL ASSAULT—SERVIA AND BULGARIA HAVE NOT YET DECLARED WAR.

(Special to Daily News.)
London, Oct. 10.—No further extension of the Balkan war has been reported. The rumor that formal declarations of war had been issued by Bulgaria and Serbia are untrue. The Montenegrin forces have driven the Turks back from the frontier.

Prince Peter, youngest son of King Nicholas, fired the first shot, which was a signal for the general assault.

Cettinje, Oct. 10.—King Nicholas yesterday issued a proclamation summoning all Montenegrins to go immediately to the

assistance of the Servians, whose women and children have been massacred by the Turks.

Berlin, Oct. 9.—General war in the Balkans has practically been inaugurated is the opinion of diplomatic and press circles. The foreign office has practically given up all hope of the powers being able to effect any settlement. Servian troops are being rushed to the frontier by forced marches.

BIG PELICAN SHOT IN B. C.

Great Bird Shot Within Twenty Miles of Prince Rupert on Exhibition in Burns' Market.

On exhibition in the big window at P. Burns' market on Third avenue is a stuffed pelican, the property of Mr. W. H. Sherman. In addition to it being a particularly handsome bird, it has the unique record of being the only bird of its species ever killed in British Columbia.

It was shot within twenty miles of Prince Rupert by a fisherman, who sold it to Mr. Sherman, and he sent it to Vancouver to be stuffed. It only returned this week.

How the bird ever left its natural habitation and came to this district will never be known, but it would be interesting to find out if any other pelicans have been seen in the vicinity.

BURGLAR SENTENCED TO THREE YEARS IN THE PENITENTIARY

ERNEST BROWN, CONVICTED OF BREAKING INTO FRIZZELL'S MEAT MARKET, IS GIVEN THREE-YEAR TERM BY JUDGE YOUNG.

Ernest Brown, the man arrested after an exciting chase following his breaking into Frizzell's meat market one night last week was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary by His Honor Judge Young yesterday.

According to the testimony submitted, Brown was seen by Mrs. Casley, wife of the proprietor of the Empress Hotel, to climb into the meat market through the transom. She gave the alarm, and although the accused succeeded in getting out of the building, he did not do so until it was too late to make his escape, for several men, headed by Mr. Casley, succeeded in run-

ning him down after an exciting chase.

In his flight, Brown fell and injured himself, and when caught was in a dazed condition.

He pleaded that he had been drinking heavily and was not responsible for his actions. His Honor did not place any credence in the defense and sentenced him to serve three years in the penitentiary.

Albert Noel, who, despondent from drink, attempted to end his life by jumping off the G. T. P. wharf, also stood trial. After listening to the defense, which was that he had been drinking heavily, His Honor allowed Noel to go on suspended sentence.

LAURIER IN ROUSING SPEECH ADVOCATES A CANADIAN NAVY

TEXT OF SIR WILFRID'S SPEECH AT CORNWALL WHEN HE ADVOCATED CANADIAN NAVY—NATIONALISM AND JINGOISM.

Cornwall, Oct. 9.—In clear cutting tones, Sir Wilfrid Laurier the other night delivered his message on the naval problem. Faced by an audience estimated at between five and seven thousand cheering people in the big Cornwall rink, which was cleared of seats to enable the great gathering to be accommodated, the liberal chieftain dealt freely and frankly with the question. Repeatedly he was interrupted by outbreaks of enthusiasm and cheers.

"At the present time," said he, "there are some men in Toronto and in Winnipeg—well disposed

men in both parties, Liberal and Conservative—who have signed a memorial, a copy of which they have sent me, asking the leader of the government to consult with the leader of the opposition, my humble self, with a view to making the naval policy unanimous. But the thought forced itself upon me, would it not make more for the unanimity of the naval policy to address the request to the two warring factions in the Conservative party, Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Borden, to Mr.

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SIX HUNDRED SUBJECTS OF BALKAN STATES WILL LEAVE THIS DISTRICT

Monster Mass Meeting Held Yesterday in Which Servians, Montenegrins, Greeks, and Bulgarians Pledge Their Loyalty
---Cable King Nicholas Offer of Services

Loyalty and devotion to country was manifested on every side at the mass meeting of Montenegrins, Servians, Bulgarians, Greeks and Roumanians, held yesterday in the big dining room at the Cettinje Hotel. A telegram was sent to King Nicholas of Montenegro advising him that the Pan-Hellenic people of Northern British Columbia are willing to return to shed their blood, if need be, for the subjugation of the Turks, who for so long have oppressed them.

Patriotic speeches were delivered by several leaders of the different colonies, and everyone was urged to return to the seat of war if the country needed their aid.

A committee was appointed at the meeting to tour the outlying places on the line of construction of the G. T. P. and the Portland Canal and urge upon all to prepare to leave immediately for Europe.

After the crowd had been addressed by Mr. Nick Martinovich and others they resolved to send a cablegram at once to the Servian King to confirm the report published in The News of the declaration of war, and in the event of such being the case they offered their services.

An answer to the cable was expected this afternoon, but an accident to the telegraph wires

near Ashcroft, may have delayed the message, which was destined to have been read to another meeting this afternoon.

Mr. Teddy Foto, in conversation with a representative of the Daily News, said that in and about this district at the present time it was estimated that there are in the neighborhood of between six and seven hundred men. About seventy-five per cent. of these are reservists of the different Balkan nations involved, and would return, and in addition almost the entire other twenty-five per cent. would voluntarily offer themselves and accompany their fellow countrymen to the war.

AEROPLANES TO BE PURCHASED

In Spite of Col. Sam Hughes Saying That Aeroplanes are Useless, Six Will Be Purchased.

London, Oct. 10.—That the recent military manoeuvres proved conclusively the value of the aeroplane in time of war is borne out by the issuance by the war office of an order for the supply of six or seven additional aeroplanes, to be attached to the present unit.

The order stipulates that the machines must be so constructed as to carry quick firing guns.

NEWS NOTES OF THE CHARLOTTE

Items of Interest from Queen Charlotte Islands—Big Saw Mill Now in Operation.

Graham Island settlers will soon be able to get lumber at Vancouver prices, as there has arrived at Masset Inlet a large saw mill plant for the Masset Inlet Lumber Company. The plant is complete and up-to-date, and will soon be in running order.

During the past few months many settlers arrived. Robert Hazelton, of Hazelton & Wolmagott, the well known Vancouver boat builders, is starting a large boat building concern on Masset Inlet, where any kind of boat or launch up to forty feet in length will be built. So far over three million feet of lumber has been used at Allford Bay and Skidegate in connection with the fisheries building and wharves. The local saw

mill of the Moresby Island Lumber Company supplied over two million feet of the material.

Turkey's standing army, while carried at 375,000 on a peace footing, consists, in fact, of only about 120,000 men absolutely under arms. The Turkish forces are widely scattered through European Turkey and Asia Minor, while many of her troops have been sent into Tripoli, where she is at war with Italy.
