**BRITAIN WILL NOT INTERFERE  
BETWEEN TURKEY AND BALKANS**

**PREMIER ASQUITH MAKES A SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT IN REGARD TO BRITISH POLICY IN EAST—BALKANS ENTITLED TO FRUITS OF VICTORY.**

London, Nov. 10.—In a stirring speech at the Lord Mayor's inaugural banquet on Saturday night the Premier, Mr. Asquith, made several significant statements in regard to the Balkan question and British interference in the troubles of the Near East. He said: "Upon one thing I believe the general opinion of Europe will be unanimous, that is that the victors should not be robbed of the fruits which have cost them so dearly."

and nowhere was there any disposition to rob the victors of the territory they had acquired. "England," he said, "has no direct interest in the exact form which the political and territorial redistributions may take. The special relations of the powers—geographical, economic, ethical and historical—with the scene of the conflict were such that they cannot be expected to claim a voice when the time comes for the permanent settlement."

He referred to the unsuccessful efforts made by the powers of Europe to prevent the conflict and to the great changes the war had made in the map of Europe. He said the fall of Constantinople might occur at any moment. The Prime Minister added: "In these anxious times it is satisfactory to be able to announce that the relations of England with the other powers, without a single exception, were never more friendly."

Premier Asquith refrained from indicating the points that must emerge for solution. "For the moment and as long as a state of belligerency continues," he declared, "His Majesty's government deprecates raising and pressing isolated questions which if handled separately and at once may seem likely to lead to irreconcilable divergencies, but which may assume different, perhaps a more practicable aspect, if left to be settled from the wider point of view in the general settlement."

**BONA FIDE SETTLERS.**

The Editor: We shall be very thankful to you for giving space in your esteemed paper to the following statement: In the number of October 26 of the "Strike Bulletin" we find a misstatement entitled "Colonizing." The gentlemen of the strike committee are evidently seeing ghosts. To put them at ease we hereby declare: 1. That we are not connected in any way with the construction of the G. T. P. railway and are not furnishing any labor to said line. 2. That our colonization work is exclusively such, and we sell farms only to bona fide settlers, who will start immediately to clear and cultivate same. Now, it is very probable that some of these people during the winter time when there is no work on the farm will look for outside work, and some of them may work on railroad construction, but, being generally recognized as most desirable laborers, they certainly will not dream for a moment to work for a cent less than any other laborer in this country and certainly not for an idiotic wage of 50 cents a day as suggested by the gentlemen of the strike committee. 3. We most heartily agree with the statement that "the workers will own the earth," but it will be workers who till hard and know how to keep and enjoy the result of their work, and certainly not people whose ideal seems to be to avoid any kind of work at any price.

**BULGARS BRED FOR FIGHTING**

Bulgarian Peasants Trained in Art of War—Determined and Happy People Used to Hardships Writing in the London Daily Mirror Charles Woods, a noted journalist, tells of the character of the Turks and their foes, the Bulgarians. Of the latter he says: As far as Bulgaria is concerned, the men, for the most part types of a healthy peasant race, are as hardy as their Turkish enemies. For years all ranks have been so trained as to perfect themselves in the art of war. The men, who march well, often singing as they go, are cheerful under the most adverse conditions. After the hardships of manoeuvres, which in Bulgaria are really carried out under war conditions, the men show no signs of fatigue, and ambulances are hardly ever required. During a final assault drums beat, and the men cheer in a manner which would be a good example for any European army. Music and dancing are great things in the Bulgarian army. The cadets at the officers' college are taught dancing, which they practice together as part of their military instruction. Squads of young men are even obliged to sing as they march about the barracks square. The Bulgarian army is well clothed and equipped. The men wear a rough service dress, with a brownish colored overcoat, on active service. The foot and leg gear for the most part would

consist of native sandal shoes and putties or bandages of thick white serge. As far as the necessities of life are concerned, the conscript requires but little better rations than the Turk. About 4d. per day is the calculated cost of feeding a Bulgarian soldier. Whilst in peace the men are provided with a sort of soup, stew, bread, beans and tea, in war they would probably receive rations composed of fat bacon and biscuits.
