JOE BAYLEY COMPLAINS THAT HE GOT THE WORST OF THE DECISION IN BOUT WITH HYLAND—LED IN EVERY ROUND AND SHOULD HAVE WON ON POINTS.

Never again will Tommy Burns, ex-champion heavyweight pugilist of the universe, officiate as the third man in the ring in a contest in which Joe Bayley, champion lightweight of Canada, participates as a principal. Bayley and his manager, Morris Condon of Victoria, declare that they are through with Burns after the draw decision the latter handed out in the Bayley-Hyland scrap at Calgary on Thanksgiving Day. Both are positive in their opinions that the Canadian champion was given the worst of the decision and they say they will take no more chances.

Manager Condon becomes heated under the collar whenever he thinks of the decision Burns handed out and he bandies no words in admitting his disgust at getting a draw when he figured his protegee had won very easily. "How can a man who does not make a single lead during fifteen rounds of milling earn a draw when the other fellow carries the fight to him in every round?" is the pertinent question which Manager Condon hurled at anyone who asks his opinion of the

Can Punish Fogel New York, Nov. 11.—Thomas J. Lynch, president of the National League, does not agree with the contention of Horace Fogel, president of the Philadelphia club, that the league has no jurisdiction in the matter of investigating Fogel's alleged statements reflecting upon National League baseball umpires.

Gyantse, in Thibet, boasts the highest golf course in the world. The next highest is the course at Gulmberg, in the Himalayas, which is 8,500 feet above the sea level, but Gyantse, standing at a height of 12,100 feet, easily bears off the palm for golf at a high altitude.

The Gyantse course is one of nine holes, situated on the right bank of Niang Chu River. The average length of the holes is 280 yards, the longest being more than 500 yards and the shortest 120 yards.

There is no grass on the course the whole surface being a hard baked clay, over which, especially in winter, a film of sand is blown. Where this sand drifts a "bunker" is formed. The chief hazards are collections of stones, pits, withered trees, wild iris and sand. Out of the two last named not even a Braid could play, and it is here that the advantage of the local rules is seen. Some of these may be of interest:

1. No ball can be lost in Gyantse. If not found within a reasonable time, another is put down where the first one is thought to have been lost, without penalty.

2. The lie of a ball in sand can be improved by scraping round it with hand or club. (Even then the difficulty of the shot has to be experienced to be appreciated.)

3. All thorns may be removed from the ball.

Jeanette Replaces Johnson. New York, Nov. 11.—With a view to deciding on a successor to Johnson's title of heavyweight champion of the world, W. C. J. Kelly, representing Hugh McIntosh, the Australian promoter, signed today a contract with Dan McKelrick, manager of Joe Jeanette. The contract calls for the appearance of Jeanette in five contests in Australia, the first of which will be with Sam Langford and the second with Sam McVey.

McIntosh agrees to give Jeanette \$25,000, with the privilege of 25 per cent. of the gate, with five round trip tickets for himself, manager and sparring partners, and they will sail from San Francisco the latter part of this month.

In addition to these stipulations, McIntosh will donate a gold belt, emblematic of the world's heavyweight championship.
