JOE'S CHANCES IN AUSTRALIA

Antipode Sport Thinks Joe Bayley Would Do Well in Australia—Clean Fighting.

Writing to a friend in Victoria James C. Bendrodt, a well known local athlete a few years ago and now manager of a big roller skating concern in Sydney, Australia, says that the greatest sport in Australia at the present time is boxing. Bendrodt has kept in touch with Joe Bayley's performances and thinks that there is a splendid chance for the little champion out in the land of the kangaroo.

Some interesting extracts from Bendrodt's letter follow: "Hugh D. McIntosh's stadium is an enormous place. It is all roofed in now and lights are staged rain or shine. Sydney is full of fighting men from all parts of the world and every ship brings more of them. I saw Langford and McVey fight here twice. Langford will beat McVey any time by reason of the fact that he is a fighting machine pure and simple, with the heart of a lion and the strength of a gorilla. McVey is the cleverer man, but has not the fighting instinct that Langford has."

"I know McIntosh and am the holder of a complimentary ticket for the season. Thus I see all the big bouts. Tell Joe Bayley that Sydney is full of lightweights—Frenchmen, Australians and Americans—and that there is a swell chance for him to come out here and make good. Tell him also that it is all clean break fighting out here; they frown on infighting. I don't think he would have the least trouble getting started here and if he got off well in his first couple of bouts would be in a position to make good money.—Colonist.
