



PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given to the electors in the polling divisions listed below, of the PRINCE RUPERT Electoral District, that I have received Her Majesty's Writ to the directed, and bearing date the NINETEENTH day of MAY, 1960, commanding me to cause the following questions, namely:---

A. Are you in favour of the sale of beer, ale, and stout only under a public-house licence for consumption on licensed premises?

(NOTE,---A public-house licence will be similar to the present beer-parlour licence.)

D. Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a lounge licance for consumption on licansed premises? (NOTE,-Lounge licences will be issued to cocktailbars. They will be granted only to clubs, hotels, re-
