### World News

BUENOS AIRES -- Argentine warships have crippled i mystery submarine hiding in a southern Argentine gulf, and capture of the sub is imminent, Navy Secretary Gaston Clement announced Thursday night.

Government authorities claimed the underwater intruder was successfully trapped after a 12 days of hide-and-seek near the Argentine naval base at the head of Golfo Nuevo, 650 miles south-west of Buenos Aires.

ISTANBUL, Turkey—Avalanches Thursday claimed at least seven lives in the wake of bitter cold and snow in most of Turkey. A man and his three-year-old daughter were resaned after remaining 11 hours under the debris.

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (Routers)—The Yugoslav government announced today it will let Aloysius Cardinal Stepinac be buried Saturday in Zagrob Cathedral.
