OTTAWA (CP) — The. federal and British Columbia governments today began a two-day meeting designed to consolidate their joint position before embarking Thursday on negotiations with the United States about a Columbia River development treaty.

The federal group includes External, Affairs Minister Green, Justice Minister Fulton and Resources Minister Alvin Hamilton. Lands and Forests Minister Ray Williston is the only cabinet minister in the B.C. delegation.

Both the federal and provincial governments will be represented in the bargaining team sitting down later this week with the Americans.




