Your press notices are fun to see. Make sure you get the good news of your engagement and wedding to the newspaper.

How? It's not hard. Newspapers want your announcements. But do it right. Newspapers have wedding forms available which should be returned completely filled, 48 hours before the event.

However should you not be able to obtain a form, type the information double spaced and send it to the society editor of the local paper along with a glossy print photograph if you have one on hand.

If the notice should not be published before a certain date, include a note to that

Wedding stories and photographs should be sent in at least a week in advance of the ceremony. Include the names of bride and groom and their parents, living or deceased, with home towns.

Give college affiliations, club memberships employer. Describe briefly your gown and those of your attendants and the mothers; names of all wedding party members; destination of the wedding trip, address of new home. Include your telephone number in case additional information is needed. If your family is prominent, include details of any announcement parties you have given.

Before newspaper publication of your engagement, write notes to close relatives and friends, telling them the news. If you have a commercial photographer, he will send in the wedding information and picture for you. A good time to pose for these is when you have the final fitting on

It is a gracious gesture for the bride-to-be, busy as she is, to write a short note of thanks to hostesses who entertain her at showers.
