



BERLIN (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev arrived in East Berlin today for talks with German Communist leaders that could lead to a new East-West flareup. Khrushchev arrived at Schoenefeld Airfield on the outskirts of Communist-run East Berlin, flying in from the collapsed summit conference in Paris.

He plans discussions with East German Premier Otto Grotewohl and Communist leader Walter Ulbricht. The three are expected to decide their next moves in the critical struggle for Berlin.
