IT'S WISE to choose hearty, two-slice sandwiches with fillings that travel well even in hot weather. All breads and rolls are good hot weather travellers, so use the kind that suites you best. Sliced, smoked meats and tangy cheeses are first on the preferred list of fillings, but mixtures of fish, meat, poultry or eggs are strong favorites (if they can be refrigerated until eaten). Hard cooked or devilled eggs, pickles, raw vegetables and cheese always make welcome accompaniments. All should be carefully wrapped and chilled before being transferred into the picnic basket.






