## The immigration racket

Immigration rules are meant to keep undesirables out and to control the flow of newcomers. All countries have them; if they did not they would be swamped by outsiders. Not enough thought is given to this fundamental protection of a national society. Far too easily public sympathies are mistakenly given to individuals who deliberately break these immigration laws and then in defiance seek to shelter under other Canadian laws to prevent ing them to contribute to a campaign to foil their expulsion.

Recently after long and intensive investigation—the RCMP uncovered a huge racket in Chinese immigration; linked to underworld characters in Canada and in Hong Kong who fraudulently — and at exorbitant cost to the immigrants --- sent Chinese to Canada. Many thousands of illegal entrants are thus settled in Canada. The government has no intention of returning these Chinese to Hong Kong or in human beings, the latter perhaps innocent any other place — they can stay — but the RCMP is finding an organized attempt being into wrongful entry. It is enough that these made to prevent it from securing the evidence needed to break up the immigration racket. What is essential is that the racket be stopped. and convict the ringleaders.

RCMP officials report this resistance is something new in their experience. It is not helped either by partisan criticism in Parliament, where the opposition, instead of being concerned about the racket, seems too ready to embarrass the government and the RCMP in the fulfilment of their duties.

It is reported that the racketeers are preying further on these illegal entrants by inducthe police and by imposing silence on them. The difficulties of the RCMP in cleaning up this illegal trade is thus manifest. What seems clear is that the national police force, in which this country has much cause for pride satisfaction, should be helped and not frustrated by idle adverse criticism. The public should be behind its efforts to stamp out the

### U.S. concerned over threat to Monroe doctrine

told a recent press conference, is dead, The statement was greeted in Washington with the indignant reply that the Monroe doctrine is very much alive. Nevertheless Washington is showing obvious concern over the pressure appearing around the edge of the

venerable principle. With a wary eye on Cuba, U.S. diplomats have begun repainting the "keep out" signs posted around the Western Hemisphere, 137 years ago by President James Monroe.

The threat then — in 1823 — was from Russian sottlements in Alaska and from the designs of European imperialism on the weak and newly-independent Latin American re-

Monroe solemnly pronounced that the United States would consider any attempt on the part of the European powers "to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere" as dangerous to U.S. peace and safety,

Today the U.S. sees a similar threat to Its security in Soviet Premier Khrushchev's apparent desire to take the Cubans under his protective wing.

The U.S. state department says the doctrine was supported by the "Inter-American security system through the Organization of American

"Specifically, the Organization of American States charter and the Rio Treaty provide the means for common action to protect the hemis-

phere against the intervention and aggressive designs of international communism."

The Rio Treaty of 1943 links 21 American republics, including Cuba, in a pact specifying that an attack against any American state wuold be considered an attack against all of them. It defines a "zone of security against aggression" encircling the two continents and including Greenland and the West Indies.


What action the OAS would or could take against a member country, peacefully choosing an unpopular kind of government is debatable. Argentina, in a carefully-worded note, urged Cuba to disavow any "statement which may be construed as interference by an extracontinental power in American hemispheric affairs." Cuban spokesmen lashed back that the Argentine government had "sold out" to

And at an emergency meeting of the OAS council in Washington Saturday and Monday, all 21 members endorsed a request from Peru for a foreign ministers' meeting to consider an unnamed "monaco" to hemispheric security,

solidarity and democracy. Canada is neither a member of the OAB nor a signatory to the Rio Treaty although it has shown signs recently of moving closer to the grouping.
