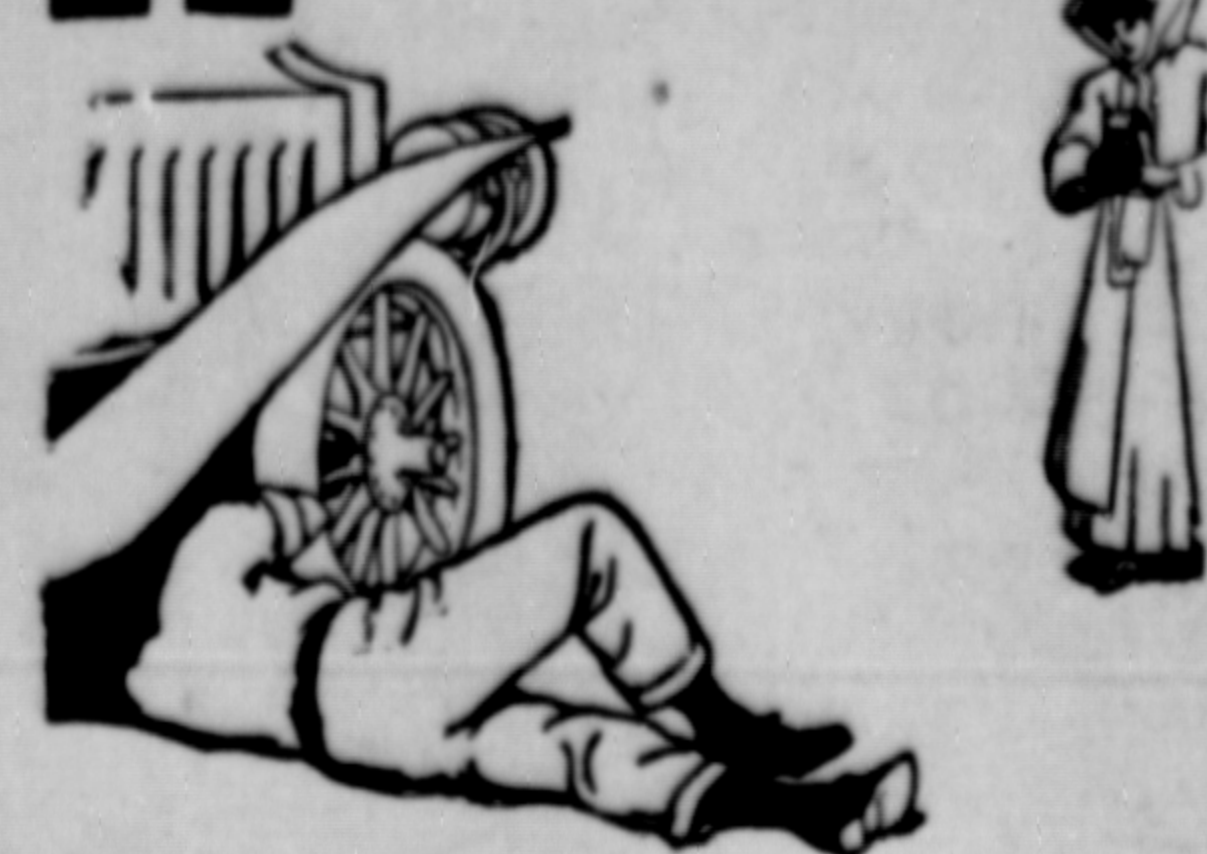

GRIFFITH STOCK COMPANY IN "NIGHT BEFORE CHRISTMAS" SCORE GREAT SUCCESS

BEST ACTING EVER SEEN IN CITY APPEARS IN "NIGHT BEFORE CHRISTMAS"—COURT ROOM SCENE VIVIDLY PORTRAYED—PLAY WRITTEN BY CONVICT.

It was disappointing that there was not a larger audience to witness the splendid production of "The Night Before Christmas" by the Griffith Stock Company last night. The play, which is a very dramatic one, was written by Hal Read while in the penitentiary for alleged murder under circumstances similar to those which he depicts in the play. The acting and work of the entire company was above reproach. The strong court room scene, the happy family circle on Christmas Eve and the final scene in the governor's home and the confession of the real criminal were each faultlessly portrayed.

As the judge who must sit in judgment on his own son, Mr. Griffith was excellent. His interpretation of the part was vivid and life-like. Every emotion was depicted upon his face as the evidence was being revealed and the climax of the scene where the jury returns the verdict of guilty was heart breaking. It was truly a great piece of acting and one that could easily be spoiled by a less proficient actor.

Miss Griffith as the mother of the accused boy played the part assigned to her as vividly as would any mother in real life of anguish when sentence was

under the circumstances. He cry pronounced and the gasp of joy when her boy was cleared of the crime apparently came from the bottom of her heart.

Miss Mitchell in several parts was all that could be desired. As the mother of the judge she was excellent and carried through the trying part of the aged lady with dignity and grace.

Miss Vaughan in the role of the servant girl "Charity" was delightful and proved herself a comedienne of no mean nature.

Miss Miller as the sweetheart of the accused man acted the part in her usually brilliant manner.

Mr. Harry Lancaster as Jack Phillips, the alleged murderer, sustained himself throughout in perfection.

Rex Snelgrove in several roles was excellent. As prosecuting attorney he was a decided success as was also Claud Brenna in his role.

Roy Hague, Julia Fehr and little Flower Gray, the tiny tot who made such a success at the kinema, were without fault in their parts.

Not the least interesting part of the entertainment was the orchestra featuring a composition by Mr. George Werner, "Father Christmas."
