


#### Tag day nets more than \$500 to aid school

KAMLOOPS (CP) — A huge grey pall of smoke hung over the eastern rim of this interior British Columbia city today as dogtired firefighters prepared to sweat through another day of near-record temperatures.

The first visible signs of the 13-day fire outbreak reached Kamloops Monday night. The fire, 13 miles east of Boston Bar in the Fraser Canyon, doubled in size Monday and is raging across 8,000 acres of valuable timber. Firefighting crews today raced to the northern end of the outbreak, where the blaze is reported escaping.

MAY USE WATER BOMBER The forest service planned to have 330 men at this fire today and it is expected the newly-arrived B-17 Flying Fortress waterbomber will also be employed.
