

## NEW YORK STRIKE RIOTS RESULT IN TWO DEATHS

### CHINESE FORCED TO BREAK STRIKE IN CUMBERLAND COAL MINES BY THE POLICE

#### TWO MEN ARE KILLED AND MANY WOUNDED IN NEW YORK STRIKE

**HACKENSACK SCENE OF DESPERATE FIGHT BETWEEN UNION STRIKERS AND NON-UNION MEN—TWO DETECTIVES KILLED—MANY WOUNDED—STRIKERS AMBUSH STRIKE BREAKERS**

(Special to Daily News.)

Hackensack, N.Y., Dec. 12.—A desperate battle ensued near here yesterday between striking employees of New York, Susquehanna & Western Railroad and strike breakers who were coming to take their places.

Several hundred of the strikers ambushed under the pallisade overlooking the Hudson river, and when the barges on which the strike-breakers approached the coal dock on which they were to land, opened fire upon them.

The non-unionists gained the shore and clambered up the hill towards the strikers and a pitched battle followed, in which two men, detectives, were killed and many wounded on both sides.

#### PORT EDWARD DEPENDS LARGELY ON THIS CITY

**Growth of New Port is Largely Wrapped Up in Advancement of Prince Rupert**

Walter B. Baer, manager of the Port Edward Townsite Co., Limited, is a Princeton University and New York Law School man. He was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of New York state in 1910, but gave up the practice of law in 1911, and came out to Seattle where he became connected with the Denney Renton Clay & Coal Company, the largest manufacturing concern in the state of Washington, (employing 950 men and having a pay roll in excess of one million dollars per annum). After being with that company some time, Mr. Baer was made its junior officer, and assistant in the management of the company.

At the time he left Seattle to take up the work in connection with Port Edward, he was a director and secretary of the Seattle Manufacturers' Association, and a member of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Seattle Rotary Club, Seattle Ad. Club, etc. Mr. Baer is enthusiastic over the prospects of the new townsite. He believes that Port Edward will prove to be a desirable locating point for many industries and that with the advantages Porpoise Harbor offers it should rapidly grow into a thriving city. In his opinion the growth of Port Edward is to a great extent dependant upon the continued prosperity of Prince Rupert.



#### POLICE FORCE CHINESE TO GO INTO MINES AND BREAK STRIKE

**ALLEGED THAT THE SPECIAL POLICE SENT TO CUMBERLAND TOLD CHINAMEN THEY WOULD HAVE TO WORK OR CLEAR OUT OF THE COUNTRY**

Vancouver, Dec. 11.—"Neither the Provincial or Dominion governments will interfere in the strike of the coal miners on Vancouver Island, for the reason they know that the result of any investigation on their parts as to the conditions existing in the mines, or as to the merits or demerits of the strike, would result in a victory for the strikers."

This statement was made by Mr. George Pettigrew, one of the members of the Board of the International Mine Workers' Association, during his address to a mass meeting held in the Dominion theatre, for the purpose of putting before the union men of the city the story of the strike and the conditions which the strikers are in.

**Government Impedes**  
"Sir Richard McBride," the speaker went on, "was asked by a committee of the striking miners to look into the trouble and to make every investigation in connection with the affair. In refusing to do this he stated that under the Mines Act of the province he found no clause which compelled him to do this. Instead of helping to make a settlement between the striking miners and the mine owners the government has, by refusing to comply with the request of the miners regarding the investigation, impeded any settlement which might have been arrived at."

In going into the history of the strike the speaker said: "It is now twelve weeks since the commencement of the strike, and although it has many times been reported that it has been settled this is not so, and better proof of this statement cannot be had than the knowledge that Mr. Bowser has sent into the strike constables, when they arrived in."

the strike zone, immediately went amongst the Chinese miners, who out of sympathy, with their white coworkers, had also refused to go into the mines to work. The police told them, as per instructions, that they would have to choose between going to work and getting out of the country. They also told the Chinese merchants that if help were supplied to the strikers by them they would be forced out. The result of this plan was that some 200 of the Chinese went back to work, but only worked sufficiently long each week so that they would be left unmolested by the government.

"It was here that the government came to the help of the Canadian Collieries, Limited. By sending in the special constables they were the cause of any trouble which subsequently took place between the strikers and others. Not only had these policemen the power to carry out the law, but they also had the power to break it. Many of them were drunken fellows and at different times started trouble which they themselves were wholly responsible for."
