

HAVANA (Reuters)—The Cuban government today nationalized all banks in Ouba except two Canadian banks, the Royal Bank of Canada and the Bank of Nova Scotia, In a sweeping law the government also nationalized 382 companies including 105 Cuban-owned sugar mills.

The guardsmen were summoned to back up police in Salisbury, Gwelo and Bulawayo where bloody rolts and strikes have erupted in the past week.

NEW YORK (M-Prosident Bisonhower has agreed to serve as a roving ambassador if Vico-President Nixon is elected prosident, it was reported today. The New York Herald Tribune and the New York Times carried the report in dispatches from Los Angelos, where Nixon is on a campaign tour.
