VICEROY HARDINGE OF INDIA WOUNDED BY BOMB

TWENTY-TWO MEN DROWNED IN GALE ON THE ROCKY NEWFOUNDLAND COAST

Crew of Florence Gain Rocky Ledges But are Unable to Climb Great Cliffs and are Driven From Refuge By Tide and Waves---Unable to Make the Ship They Drown

(Special to Daily News.)
St. John's, Nfld., Dec. 23.—Twenty-two of the twenty-seven members of the crew of the Furze Line steamer Florence, from Halifax, N. S., to St. John's, lost their lives in the wreck of the vessel when she went ashore on the rocky ledge west of St. John's on Friday during a terrible northwest gale.

The ship ran ashore on a most inaccessible part of the coast, where the shore line is composed of rugged cliffs a hundred feet high. The crew escaped from the vessel which they momentarily expected to break and gained a footing on the ledges at the foot of the cliff, up which they were unable to climb.

Caused Anxiety.

Returning to the city yesterday from a trip to Cameleon Inlet, Messrs. Kennaugh and Tampkin caused a good deal of relief to their many friends, as fear for their safety was expressed owing to their being away considerably longer than they had intended. However, nothing untoward occurred, the rough weather causing them to have to delay their return waiting for a favorable opportunity to make the trip safely.

NEW ANGLICAN CHURCH WAS OPENED YESTERDAY

Beautiful New Church Near McBride Street Opened Yesterday Morning By Rev. Burch.

Despite the fact of the inclemency of the weather, large congregations attended both morning and evening services at the new Anglican Church, which was opened yesterday for the first time for divine service.

As it is of course known, the upper portion of the building is not completed yet, and for the present the services will be held in the large and spacious hall below the church, which will later be used as a church hall and club room.

It was Bishop Du Vernet's intention to be present yesterday morning, but owing to his not returning from Masset until the afternoon he was not able to do so.

The rector, the Rev. E. C. Burch, assisted by the Rev. W. E. Collison, conducted the morning service, and Bishop Du Vernet and the rector officiated in the evening. The services were fully choral with a surpliced choir and there was a large attendance of members of the church and others both morning and evening.

VICEROY OF INDIA, LORD CHARLES HARDINGE, BADLY WOUNDED BY BOMB

Fanatic Throws Bomb at Viceroy as He Enters the New Capitol in State This Morning---Attendant on Same Elephant Instantly Killed---Extent of Wounds Not Known Although Serious

Delhi, India, Dec. 23.—Lord Charles Hardinge, viceroy of India, was wounded and an attendant of his was instantly killed by a bomb hurled from a house top as he was entering the city of Delhi, the new capitol, in state today.

The bomb struck the howdah, or basket in which the Viceroy was sitting on the elephant's back. The attendant was killed instantly, while the extent of Lord Hardinge's injuries could not be ascertained, although it

was evident that they were serious. He was hurried to the hospital.

The troops attending the celebration and the personal body-guard of the Viceroy surrounded the house in an effort to find the would-be murderer.

Following the attempted assassination, the festivities prepared in the honor of the Viceroy were abandoned and military law was enforced, sentries being placed on guard, while the officers and men assisted the civil police in their efforts to apprehend all those implicated in the outrage.

At first it was thought that it might be the concerted plan of the leaders in a rebellion, but now it is believed to have been the dastardly deed of fanatics.

London, Dec. 23.—Great consternation reigns in London over the report just circulated that the Viceroy of India, Lord Charles Hardinge, has been wounded by a bomb hurled from a house top by a fanatic. The extent of his wounds is not known, although it is stated that his attendant, who was on the same elephant, was killed.

Schedule K—Wool, Jan. 27.

Schedule N—Sundries, Jan. 29.

Free List—Administrative and miscellaneous, Jan. 31.

TURKISH INHABITANTS TRY TO HOIST OTTOMAN ENSIGN

TURKISH FLEET APPEARS OFF TENEDIOS AND TURKISH INHABITANTS OF CITY RUN UP CRESCENT FLAG—GREEK SAILORS OPEN FIRE—NO DAMAGE TO CITY BY TURKS.

Athens, Dec. 23.—The Governor of Tenedios in despatches today reports that the Turkish battleship Torgut Reis, the cruiser Medjidien and three destroyers appeared at 11 o'clock this morning before the entrance of the Dardanelles. The warships remained under the protection of the forts, and the destroyers advanced and fired with shells on Tenedios, where the Turkish inhabitants attempted to hoist the Turkish flag and put off in boats to welcome the warships. A small force of Greek bluejackets on the island fired on the multi-neers, killing three of them and wounding twelve others. The Turkish shells did no damage and the destroyers quickly retired to the Dardanelles.
