

TNT TEST-Scientists and technicians from Canada, the U.S. and Britain watched this scene over the southern Alberta prairie Thursday morning as 20 tons of TNT was exploded in a gigantic red ball of flame. The ball reached this stage about one second after the detonation near the Suffield Experimental Station northwest of Medicine Hat. Black smoke then enveloped. the flame and an atomic-like mushroom cloud rose 600 feet over the site. Child murder suspects appear in police court

BURNABY (CP)—Two women murder suspects, both from the Interior of B.C., appeared in police court here Monday and were remanded until August 29. Mrs. Violet May Benson, the mother of four is charged with the shotgun slaying of her husband at

their home near Creston, July 21. Mrs. Winnifred Dorothy Tosoff. of Prince George is charged in the August 13 death of a threeyear-old gril. The girl was left in her charge by the provincial social welfare department.

The two cases were remanded here, said a court official, as a convenience until the women, now lodged in Oakalla prison, are returned to the Interior for preliminary hearing.
