In the Letter Box

Make 1913 a Lucky Year.
Prince Rupert, Jan. 3, 1913.

Dear Sir: The election has started. The time is an anxious one. Prince Rupert is at the present time probably the only city that has not increased in prosperity during the past two years. Is she going to be in the same position next year? This is not to advocate any candidate, but to recommend that we, as citizens, brace up and get rid of the idea that Prince Rupert will not be any good until the railway is through. If we wait until the railway is through it will be too late. Now is the time to start. Let the coming council, whoever they may be, obtain the services of an industrial commissioner, whose sole business it would be to get after large industries to start here. Let the council make a point of encouraging industries to come here. Let them keep at the government and make them start their various works here. Let them get the Grand Trunk and the government to help in this by offering land at low lease or as gifts for these purposes. Let the council seriously consider whether it would not be policy to offer some advantages to industries to come here. This does not necessarily mean giving away franchises. But let us realize that if Prince Rupert is to take her proper place she must start in now and not wait until the railway gets through. Make 1913 a lucky year.

BULKLEY VALLEY AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION

Annual Meeting to be Held on Jan. 11th—Will Consider Sending an Exhibit to Prince Rupert Fair

Business of considerable importance is on the order paper for the annual general meeting of the Bulkley Valley Agricultural Association and Farmers' Institute, which is to be held in Svenson's Hall, Telkwa, on Saturday, Jan. 11th, at 2.30 p.m. A draft constitution and by-laws will be submitted to the members; reports of officers will be received, and officers, directors and auditors for 1913 will be elected. In addition there will be discussion on many matters of importance, including the following topics: Co-operative buying and selling; the holding of a show next fall; shall steps be taken to acquire exhibition site in the new town?; shall a valley exhibit be sent to Prince Rupert fair? What further can be done towards obtaining an experimental farm?

The directors of the Association have applied to the department of agriculture for the services of a lecturer, and it is expected one of the department's officials will visit the Valley in the year. Residents of the Bulkley Val-

ley who are desirous of becoming members of the Association and Institute are invited to attend the meeting. It is hoped the already large membership of this useful organization will be considerably increased for 1913.

STRIKING ADDRESS BY ONTARIO LEADER

Great Speech by N. W. Rowell, K. C., Issued in Pamphlet Form.

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—Copies of an address given by Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., leader of the Liberal party in Ontario, on "What Liberalism Has Done for Canada" before the Montreal Reform Club on November 10th last will be ready for free distribution in a short time from the Central Liberal Information office, 63 Sparks street, Ottawa. Any person desiring a copy of this address will receive it at once on writing to the information office.

In this address Mr. Rowell gave a careful outline of the work done by the Liberal party in shaping the destinies of Canada, not only in her domestic affairs, but also in her relations with the Mother Country and the rest of the Empire, especially with regard to the development of political and trade relations and Canada's share in the problems of defence. He particularly showed the effect of the Liberal principles on the main events in Canadian history—the early struggles for responsible government. Canadian confederation; Canada's evolution from a colony to the status of a self governing nation, and finally her entry into Imperial Affairs with the creation of the Imperial conference.

Mr. Rowell laid stress upon the noble work done by Sir Wilfrid Laurier as head of the Liberal party in this national and Imperial development, and shows that "it was the triumphs of the Federal principle—the Liberal principle—giving local autonomy to the Canadian confederation as it is today; and it is the extension of that principle to the other self governing dominions of the Empire and expansion under the growth and expansion under the British system of government of harmonious co-operation with the Motherland that we witness today." Mr. Rowell's address throughout is one of keen interest, and should be read by all Liberals as an illuminative justification of their political faith.
