**NEW WING OF HOSPITAL
TO BE OPENED IN MARCH**

HON. DR. YOUNG, PROVINCIAL SECRETARY, WILL BE INVITED TO OFFICIATE AT OPENING CEREMONIES—MR. J. G. SCOTT WINS P. R. CLUB DEBENTURE.

There were present yesterday afternoon at the regular monthly meeting of the Hospital Board, besides the president, Mr. D. G. Stewart, Messrs. O. H. Nelson, J. H. Thompson, C. V. Bennett, J. A. Kirkpatrick, Mayor Newton and Alderman Douglas. The first business transacted was the drawing for the Prince Rupert Club debenture, valued at \$100, owned by the association, and which they had raffled as a means of raising funds most urgently needed. In order that everything might be strictly en règle, genial "Billy" Vickers, chief of police, was asked to attend and assist at the momentous ceremony. After the stubs bearing the duplicate numbers to the tickets purchased had been thoroughly shaken up in one of the city ballot boxes, the president called upon Mayor Newton to draw one out of the box, the lucky number to be declared the winner. It chanced to be number 268, the fortunate winner being J. G. Scott of the Kaien Hardware Co. Amidst much laughter and congratulations to Mr. Scott, the Board took their seats and proceeded with the regular business of the meeting.

As the new wing is not yet completed—as a matter of fact, Contractor Hicks requires a month's extension of time for the completion of his contract, which was granted by the board—it was decided that the formal opening should take place some time in March. Provincial Secretary Hon. Dr. Young is to be invited to visit Prince Rupert for the occasion and perform the ceremony. Before adjourning a resolution was passed thanking Messrs. Williams & McMeekin, Stalker & Wells, George Frizzell and Mrs. Roberson for their generous donation of good things for the festive season.

Will Be a Candidate.
Alderman Dybhavn, chairman of the Board of Works, will be a candidate for the new council, running in Ward Two. His platform will be announced later.
