DRILLING FOR OIL ON GRAHAM ISLAND

No Place on Western Coast of America Shows Better Indications—Several Companies Are Operating.

Mr. F. Panvini, who returned to the city a few days ago from the west coast of Graham Island, showed to a representative of The News yesterday a large piece of paraffin wax which he picked up among the rocks. It was part of a piece weighing about six pounds.

Mr. Panvini is actively interested in oil propositions on the islands, being associated with several companies that are now drilling for oil. Among them are the Graham Island Oil Fields, Ltd., the Queen Charlotte Oil Fields, Ltd., and the B. C. Oil Fields, Ltd.

The latter concern is pushing operations as rapidly as conditions will permit. At the present time the drill is down to a depth of about 200 feet.

Mr. Panvini states that there are no oil fields on the western coast of America that have stronger and more encouraging indications of oil than those on the west shores of Graham Island.

ONLY ONE MORE TRIP FOR POPULAR CAPTAIN

Captain Johnson, of the Prince Rupert, Made 107 Round Trips to City of Prince Rupert.

Captain Barney Johnson, the popular skipper of the Prince Rupert, will make only one more trip to this port as captain of a G. T. P. boat. He has received the appointment of a Vancouver pilot and will assume his new duties upon returning after the next round trip here from Vancouver. This is a responsible and lucrative position which has been offered to Captain Johnson as an indication of his merit as a coast mariner. Altogether Captain Johnson has made 107 round trips between this port and the lower coast cities. He has commanded the Prince Rupert since her initial voyage in these northern waters. Her first landing was made here on the 18th of June, 1910, proceeding on as far as Stewart with a crowd of argonauts for the then booming mining camp.

Before joining the G.T.P. SS, service Capt. Johnston served with the Boscovitz and Union Steamship Co. Capt. "Barney," who is one of the most popular commanding officers who ever ran into Prince Rupert, will be greatly missed by his host of friends and admirers, who nevertheless rejoice at the well merited promotion he has received. The charming residence that Captain Johnston had erected for himself on 5th Avenue, has been rented by Mr. J. D. Westenhaver.

MOSLEMS MASSACRE WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Turks Drive Christians Into a Cavern and Slaughter Them.

Athens, Jan. 14.—Moslems today massacred thirty women and children and pillaged and burned 120 houses in the village of Keramisza, in the Turkish province of Epirium, a short distance from the Greek frontier. The victims were driven out of their flaming houses and took refuge in a cavern. They were pursued by the Moslems, who first tortured and then slaughtered them. In the villages of Fortopia and Nipero, in the same region, a number of notables were massacred.
