GUGGENHEIM'S FORMER WIFE IS DEFEATED

Court Denies Pleas of Divorce— Says There Was Fraud.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—In the Circuit Court here Judge Heard denied the plea of Mrs. Grace Guggenheim-Wahl to set aside her decree of divorce from William Guggenheim, the New York copper multi-millionaire. The decision brings to an end litigation extending over three years.

In his decision Judge Heard ruled that fraud had undoubtedly been practiced upon the court which granted the original decree, as claimed by Mrs. Wahl's attorneys, but he held that she was a voluntary party to that fraud.

Guggenheim, soon after the divorce was granted, married again. Jacob Newman, one of Guggenheim's attorneys, after the decision was announced, charged that the suit to set aside the divorce decree was brought as the result of a plot in Wall street to discredit Guggenheim.

"I am convinced," said Newman, "that Mrs. Wahl was backed by a Wall street syndicate which has a private grudge to satisfy, as well as hoping to obtain a considerable part of the Guggenheim fortune."

PIONEER OF RUPERT DIED THIS MORNING

H. Gordon Munro Passed Away at Home of Capt. Robertson—An Invalid for Some Time.

There passed away this morning at 11 o'clock at the residence of Captain H. L. Robertson, Borden street, H. Gordon Munro, one of the earliest of the pioneers of Prince Rupert. Mr. Munro, who had been in a decline for some time, had been gradually failing, the end coming peacefully this morning. The deceased, who arrived here in January, 1907, was for two years with the G. T. P. engineering staff, later taking up his profession of architect in partnership with W. Nicholson Lailey. Being an invalid for the last two or three years, he went in search of health to different points in the south, returning to this city last April. He was exceedingly well known and popular with all who knew him and his early demise is the subject of the sincerest regret by all. Arrangement for the funeral will be announced later.

George Leek, amongst the successful candidate in Ward 2, was not able to be present, but received a graceful and appreciative tribute from his warm friend and supporter, Fred Stork.

Alderman Kerr, elected for his third term of office, and one of the most popular and efficient of our city fathers, was unable to attend the meeting.

Ex-Alderman Clayton, who had not sought re-election, made one of his usual witty and felicitous speeches, asking the citizens to exercise a little patience and give the new council time to get straightened around a bit and not to harass them before they got things in shape to go ahead with the year's business. He expressed unqualified satisfaction with the personnel of the council-elect.

G. W. Nickerson came up smilingly after his defeat. He did not feel it was a very bad one. He considered he polled a splendid vote when one looked at the array of splendid material there was pitted against him. He was young and not known to as many of the citizens as some of the others. He was in the position of the man who fights and runs away, being able to fight another day.

Ex-Alderman Montgomery, in thanking his supporters, said he fought for certain principles that evidently were not shared by a number of the electors.

Ex-Alderman Douglas, late finance minister, said he was defeated but not disgraced. He was not like Jim Jeffries, he could "come back" again.

O. H. Nelson, the popular member of the School Board, upon being asked to come forward by the chairman, was roundly cheered. He thanked the public for their overwhelming appreciation of his efforts, concluding by felicitating the citizens upon their highly satisfactory choice of a mayor and council for the coming year.

Chairman Fred Stork, in closing the meeting, particularly drew the attention of the public to the need of a recreation ground. He stated that a vote of the people would have to be taken as to giving the Dominion government a title to the land on Acropolis Hill to build a drill hall and lay out a recreation ground. He urged the citizens to push the matter to the farthest extent.

George D. Tite addressed a few words of congratulation all around.

The meeting closed with "God Save the King" and rousing cheers for Mr. Pattullo.

The new council will be sworn in for office at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the court house by Government Agent McMullin.

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER CAUGHT IN A BLIZZARD

Kamloops Woman Dies from Exposure When Left Helpless in Snow—Daughter in Dangerous Condition.

Kamloops, Jan. 15.—Within one hundred yards of shelter, which could not be found owing to the terrific blizzard which raged, Mrs. Cornwall, wife of Captain Cornwall, of Rosehill Ranch, and her daughter spent a terrible night in the snow. The mother perished of exposure and the daughter, half dead, crawled to Humphrey's home, near at hand, as soon as daylight broke. She is now in the Kamloops hospital.

Mrs. Cornwall and the little girl started from Kamloops in a sleigh on Saturday evening for their home. They were caught in a blizzard, which so frightened their horses that they bolted. The whiffletree of the sleigh caught on a stone and the vehicle overturned, leaving the two unfortunate occupants in the snow. Almost at the same spot a similar tragedy took place in November of 1911.

One Body Found.

News reached the city yesterday afternoon that the body of Percy Graham, one of the two employees of the B. C. Fisheries Company, drowned at Aliford Bay a few days ago, has been found. Men are still engaged in searching for the body of Fred Newham, who was mate of the trawler Triumph.
