were any halibut caught there. When he was appointed captain of the Rupert his name had been changed in the Vancouver papers from Captain Barney to Captain Byron, but it was a pleasure to know that he is still the same old Barney.

Others who added their tribute of esteem and regret were Aldermen Naden, Sutherland and McCaffery, H. S. Wallace, M. Albert, Captain Horvik, Captain Groves, W. E. Davidson, D. G. Stewart, J. Y. Rochester, A. J. Burroughs and H. F. McRae. Dr. Tremayne and J. M. Christie of the Bank of Commerce both corroborated the story of Barney's seasickness on the sound.
Captain Johnson's Reply.

Just before bringing the banquet to a close, Captain Johnson was given an opportunity of replying. In a jovial manner he denied the slanderous statement that he had been seasick on the sound. Never before had he heard so many nice things said about him. He was sorry to leave Prince Rupert and had hoped to have his own son learn the elements of seamanship on Prince Rupert harbor. Nothing but a much better appointment could have induced him to leave. He was going to keep his residence here and hoped that at some time he might occupy it. In his early days he had learned from a superior officer to treat every passenger as he would a guest in his own home. This he had tried to do and he had been materially helped by the good fellowship of the travellers who went to and from Prince Rupert.
