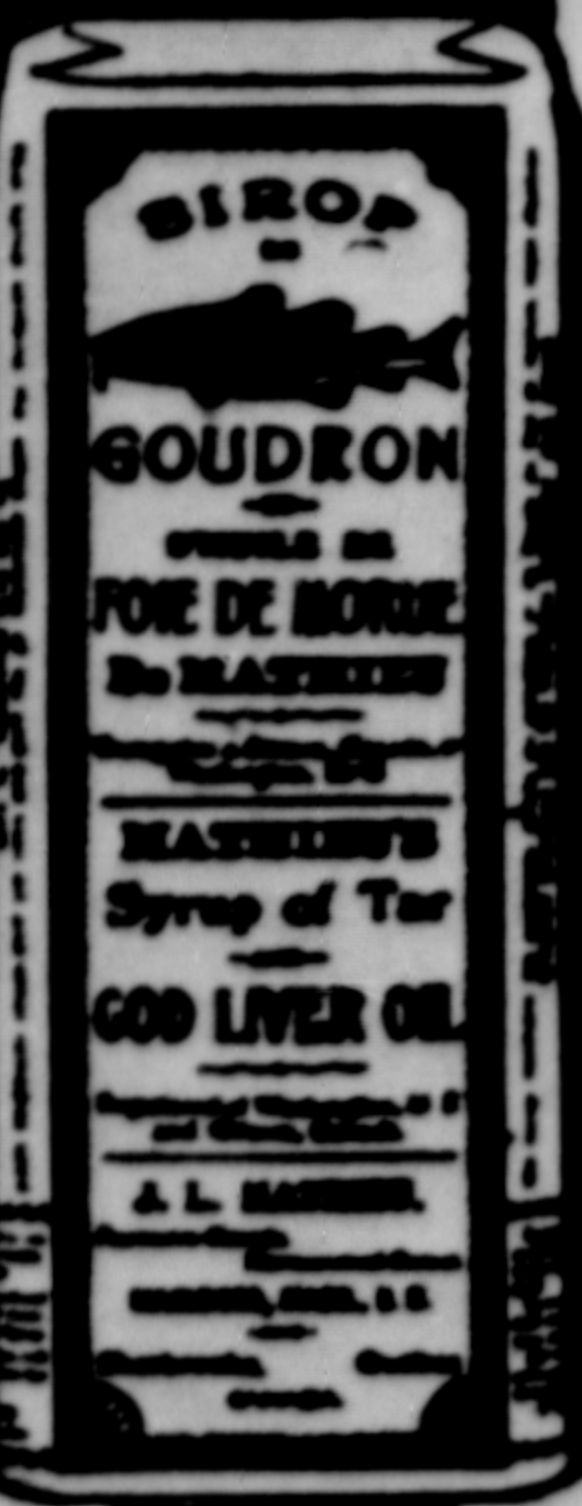

las, who briefly referred to the
late municipal campaign, intimat-

Rupert. He was proud of the local

AT THE THEATRES.

Westholme.

It is difficult to imagine what
is going to be the end as regards
the moving picture business.
Each week one goes to the differ-
ent "movie" houses and wonder-
ful and more wonderful still are
the subjects handled, as also the
interpretation. Last evening at
the Westholme Opera House the
three reel feature film, "Custer's
Last Stand," was a revelation and
the best yet. The story is well
known to most of us, of the
heroic fight put up by the little

adequately describe it. There
was a crowded house last night,
which will doubtless be repeated
again this evening, the last op-
portunity of seeing this stirring
and spectacular feature film.
