PLAY BLACK JACK AT NELSON HIGH SCHOOL

Trustee Understands There is More Gambling Among Students Than Downtown.

Nelson, Jan. 27.—Describing Fred Irwins, Harry Amas and Dr. N. Wolverton as "Dr. Arthur's candidates," John Hamilton, candidate for school trustee, at the opera house Saturday night, declared that the teachers of the Nelson schools were canvassing against himself and the other members of his ticket.

The fight which is being waged by Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Johnston and Dr. Jones is chiefly against what they call the one-man rule of Dr. Arthur, who is secretary of the board, and also a trustee. They blame him for the lack of harmony in the school management for the last four or five years and declare that the secretary should not be a trustee on the ground that the dual position gives an opportunity for abuse of power.

Dr. Jones on Saturday threw a bombshell into the audience when she declared that it was said that there was more gambling at the high school than downtown. Black jack and poker are said to be the games most patronized by the students.

ANDERSON CAN HAVE MATCH WITH MANDOT

But Friends Don't Think He is Ripe Enough and Try to Dissuade Him

Los Angeles, Jan. 28.—Bud Anderson, of Vancouver, Wash., who decisively defeated Sammy Trott, of Columbus, Ohio, at Vernon on Saturday, can have a match with Joe Mandot in March according to a statement today by Promoter Tom Carey.

The pugilistic director believes Anderson exhibited sufficient class to entitle him to further consideration. Friends of Anderson are trying to dissuade him from the meeting in the belief that he is not yet ready for the top notchers.

Billings, Mont., Jan. 27.—Two privates of the company of United States soldiers stationed at Fort Yellowstone, in Yellowstone National Park, who disappeared while on duty January 22nd, were found today badly frozen. They lost their way in a blizzard which began soon after they left the fort. It is reported the men will recover.

STEWART RESIDENTS WANT A PHYSICIAN

Good Opening for the Right Kind of Man—Guarantee Fund of \$125 a Month Arranged.

Stewart, B. C., Jan. 27.—Through the action of the Portland Canal Miners' Union calling a public meeting to discuss the raising of funds to secure the services of a doctor for the camp, a guarantee fund of \$125 for a period of four months has been subscribed.

Patrick Daly acted as chairman, and stated that the union was prepared to give \$50 per month for this period and Vice President Percy F. Godenrath, of the Stewart General Hospital said his board would put up a similar amount. With these two guarantees and the \$25 a month given by the Provincial government under the head of medical act, a sum of \$125 is now available. The hospital will also provide residence quarters with light and heat. There is a good opening for a live physician here, particularly if he has capital to take over the local drug store, and efforts are also being made to increase the grant for medical aid up to \$500 per annum.
