That is part of one which is about 90 per cent completed and \$28,000 shy of being ready for Prince Rupert children and adults to use, summer and winter.

If you are interested, then support the forthcoming "finish the pool" drive by pledging a buck or two a week. either by payroll deduction or straight cash:

On the other hand if you're not in favor of the pledge system the only other alternative is to join forces with those wno have so many unreasonable suggestions for raising the

funds that it hardly makes common sense to tackle them. While you're thinking of an alternative you may also put in your mind the fact that the Uivic Centre Swimming pool committee has only \$500 in which to carry on this worthwille project, then the doors will be shut and construction workers

Looking at it from a sports angle, Prince Rupert has yet to turn out a top notch competitor in the swimming field. This can be strengthened by the fact that almost all of he supervisors at Nicelymont park swimming pool are from other cities and so is the man who will supervise the Civic Centre pool, when finished.

A few have said that the project was a big mistake from the start out that statement can be over-ruled by he fact that the by-law to build the pool was overwhelmingly endorsed by the property owners in the 1957 city elections.

An important point about previous canvasses that should be taken into consideration is the fact that not more than \$5,000 nas éver been collected in cash drives such as plarch of Dimes, CARS, Cancer and many others, certainly not \$28,000. Regardiess of a cash donation or a piedge it still means canvassers are asking for money.

It has been suggested that persons making donations or pledges de given so many weeks free swimming in return. 'Inat's all very well but what about these people who have put in nuncreds of hours of labor? Should they not be entitled to free swimming also? It this course was taken what revenue would there be

to operate the pool? The main concern is to raise \$28,000, and worry about what will happen as far as operational costs go when the

poor opens. but it it so happens that the money is raised through a door-to-door canvass, will it be the last time Prince Rupert residents are called on for funds for the swimming pool? Who will be responsible to supply money should the poor run at a deficit? Will the canvassers be asked to knock on doors again or will the poor be turned over to the city? The latter would seem more appropriate and even more so at this stage or the game.

it can easily be agreed that one sure way of collecting money is by taxation. So why not approach city council right now and let them take it over—we'll be sure of naving a swimming pool if it does. Civic pride, of which this city has a lot, should prevent

the city council from refusing such a request. So far a total of two canvasser meetings have been held, both of which consisted of heated arguments. A previous meeting of the Civic Centre board has proposed the drive and agreed to a pyramid system of canvassing.


Some 24 directors were at that first meeting. These 24 were asked to bring three members each to the next meeting. Forty-four came to the first canvasser meeting and after some arguing they were asked to bring three people each to the second meeting which was Tuesday night. A grand total of 33 showed up at that meeting.

How many more such meetings do they have to hold in order to get these 300? If the required number of people haven't turned out by now 50 more rallies won't make any difference.

Anyway, why should they turn out? to hear a lot of bickering? arguments? defeatism? Mind you, we'll grant you that the proposed canvassers were not given very much in the way of guidance at either of the last two meetings. However, the issue boils down to two questions and one

answer. Do we want the pool finished or do we want the work to stop some time this week because of lack of funds? The obvious answer is that we want the pool finished and

soon. Then let's pocket our pride and ask City Council for the necessary funds, to complete what will be a terrific indoor swimming pool and let's get swimming. The sooner the


