SUCCESSFUL CONCERT BY ST. ANDREW'S CHOIR

High Class Musical Programme
 Delighted Very Large Audience Last Night.

The concert given in the parish hall of St. Andrew's Church last evening in aid of the choir fund was an unqualified success, both from a musical and a financial point of view. So large was the attendance that extra seats had to be improvised and the capacity of the hall was taxed to its utmost. The strength of the choir was augmented by Mr. Armstrong and Mr. J. E. Davey, who rendered valuable assistance in the chorus work as well as in the several solos.

The two part songs, "O Hush Thee, My Baby" and "Sleep, Gentle Lady," were most creditably rendered by the choir under the direction of Mr. W. H. Mel-lar, and the quartettes by Mrs. Burch, Miss Ellett, Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Mel-lar were most pleasing. Miss Agnes Clifton is a very promising young singer who, when she overcomes a most natural nervousness, will no doubt make a name for herself. She was particularly pleasing in her encore, "Two Eyes of Gray." Mrs. Burch's beautiful soprano voice was heard to great advantage in "May Day" and "The Ros-ary." She responded to well merited encores and gave pretty English ballad selections. Miss Laura Holtby, always a favorite with Prince Rupert audiences, gave a very excellent rendition of "Thora" and chose as an encore a pretty, rippling little selection called "Rosalia." Messrs. J. E. Davey, Armstrong and Stowell renewed the favorable impression they have already made and were most happy in their choice of songs. Mr. Mark Harby, with his irrepressible companion "Billy," amused the younger members of the audience immensely. Miss Ellett and Miss Froud did most excellent work as accompanists.

STRIKE BREAKERS STABBED IN RIOT

Women and Girls Aid Porcelain Workers to Stone Imported Men.

Trenton, N. J., Feb. 3.—Dis-order of a serious character occurred Friday night in the strike of 1,500 porcelain workers in this city, when a force of strike breakers, imported by the ten plants involved in the labor trouble, attempted to leave their work.

The imported men were as-sailed on the street by a crowd of strikers, among whom were a number of women and girls. Stones and bricks were hurled, and when the two forces met at close quarters knives were used. Reserve policemen were hast-ened to the scene and a dozen strikers were arrested. Four men were taken to local hospitals suf-fering from knife wounds and bruises caused by flying bricks.

The pottery workers have been on strike for a week. A dynamite bomb was thrown into the cellar of the office of the Hudson Porcelain Works, on Seward avenue. It exploded and wrecked the office, but the rest of the plant was not damaged.
