

UFAWU answers editorial; reader blasts CBC film on Ruperi

The Editor.

The Daily News: This letter is addressed to you but is also, and most important, meant for the public of Prince Rupert to whom the United Fishermen and Allied Workers' Union has meant so much in the past both; in the economic equality it has helped attain and in the active community spirit it has shown.

You, through your scandalous editorial have slandered our organization and in return we feel compelled to answer some of the unfounded allegations you have directed at our membership (some 7,000 strong along the coast and some 1.000 strong in the two Prince Rupert Locals). May I here point out that Freedom of the Press means a responsible interpretation based upon Truth. This is what I would like the public to read as an antidote to your collection of misquotes and prefabrication as published Thursday, April 2:

Firstly, we have not as yet

had a general meeting of cither Local by which the convention proceedings could be officially reported, so your astounding assertion that our rank and file membership and (even more astounding) our lesser officials protesting our convention resolutions can only be regarded as an outright fabrication. Our meetings are open to any member to express his or her viewpoints and none has ever been denied this right. If there is any discontent or resentment to be expressed it should be and will be done at a general meeting in a manner respons-

ible to the rest of the members. In the second instance. T challenge the interpretation you have arbitrarily put upon what we actually passed at our convention. Let me state that our constitution provides for the protection of any individual member from racial, religious, or political discrimination. Our leadership is also protected by this right to polit-
