Ships under control of the maritime command include the Second Canadian Escort Squadron of nuclear-age destroyers under the leadership of Capt J., C. Pratt and an escort squadron of Prestonian class frigates under command of Capt. H. A. Porter. All are based at Esqui-

The air arm of the command will be 407 Maritime Patrol Squadron of Neptune sub-hunter aircraft under command of Wing Commander J. C. McCarthy and based at Comox, B.C.
