# SKAGWAY PEOPLE HAVE A HARD TIME KEEPING TIME

NO TWO CLOCKS BEAR ANY RELATIONSHIP TO EACH OTHER—GOVERNMENT ENDEAVORS TO TEACH PROMPTNESS, BUT—

Skagway, Alaska, Feb. 11.—The American government, through its signal officers, Messrs. Burton and Little, delivers correct time in Skagway each morning at 11 o'clock. Notwithstanding this paternal interest the government is taking in teaching promptness, there are no two clocks or chronometers in Skagway that bear any relationship to each other, or pay any attention to the daily admonition by the government.  
When it is 11 a.m. by the Canadian Pacific clock, it is 11:17 by the Alaska Steamship clock, and

the Pacific Coast regulator insists that it is only about 10:50. The jewellers' chronometers are not on speaking terms and refuse to get together.

## TEN CARS OF ORE NOW READY FOR SHIPMENT

Prospects at Silver Standard Mine Are Very Bright—Solid Ore at 150 Foot Level.

The Omineca Herald, published at New Hazelton, prints the following report of development work at the Silver Standard mine:

D. McLeod and A. L. McHugh visited the Silver Standard mine this week. The property is looking better than ever. On Tuesday Manager Haskins started men stopping at the 150 foot level and they are working in solid ore. The first round of holes were all in ore and it is hard to say how much more there is beyond. The tunnel which will crosscut the big No. 3 vein is being driven along at a good rate. They have cut a couple of smaller veins en route and are also drifting on these with encouraging results. The Silver Standard mine now has a full ten cars of ore waiting at the railway in this town. It will not be shipped until a reasonable rate is furnished by the railway company. As soon as the rate is granted then heavy shipments will be made. The mine is in shape now so that immense quantities of ore can be taken out.
