Premier Will Not Relieve Congestion

than was possible at that time.
Had the government not then
built upon the scale which they
did then, matters would, today,
have been worse.

This doubtful consolation
brought a sharp retort from the
delegation, but the premier re-
fused to hold out hopes of pre-
sent relief, but stated that an in-
vestigation would be made with
a view of finding some way in
which to avoid the postponement
of court sittings, which has pre-
viously frequently had to be done.

The reply to a request for a
substantial grant to the Royal
Agricultural and Industrial As-
sociation brought smooth words
and a little further satisfaction
to the delegates from Sir Rich-
ard McBride. The government,
said he, much appreciated the
good work done for the cause
of agriculture by New Westmin-
ster, but pointed out that so
many exhibitions were now being
held, even as far north as Fort
George, all of which claimed con-
sideration, that it became a mat-
ter of grave consideration as to
what extent assistance could be
given.

The delegates were requested
to submit their proposals in writ-
ing to the Minister of Agricul-
ture, Hon. Price Ellison, who
was absent on account of illness.
Consideration was also given
to the joint sewerage scheme for
Sapperton and Burnaby, and the
Attorney-General was instructed
to go into the matter with a view
to preparing the necessary leg-
islation to legalize the scheme.

permanently in Prince Rupert.

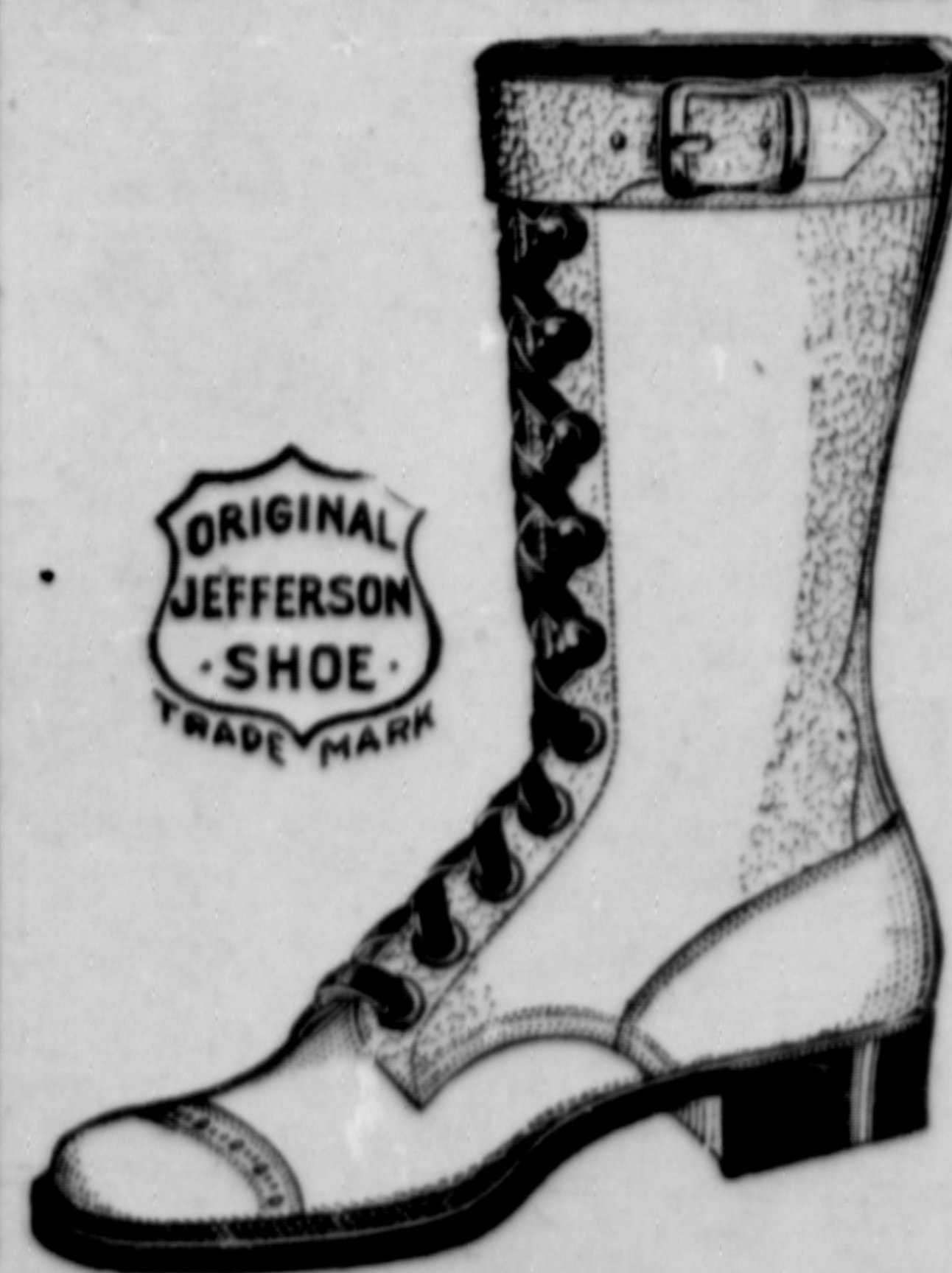
J. Fred Ritchie, of Ritchie &

AUSTRIAN SOCIALIST IS ASSASSINATED

Member of Austrian Parliament
Shot and Killed by Socialist
Labor Leader—Revenge
the Motive.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Vienna, Feb. 11.—Frank Seum-
meier, a member of the lower
house of the Austrian Parliament,
and a Socialist, was assassinated
tonight by the Christian Social-
ist labor leader, Paul Nunchak,
being shot and instantly killed.
The motive is believed to be re-
venge.

BONDS OF EMPIRE TOO MUCH STRAINED

Debate on Naval Bill Continued
by Hon. R. Lemieux—Serving
Canada the Best Way to
Serve the Empire.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Feb. 11.—The debate
on the naval policy of Premier
Borden was continued in the
House today by Hon. Rodolphe
Lemieux. A complete discussion
of the question, he said, was de-
sirable. He felt that in serving
Canada and Canada's best inter-
ests he was at the same time
serving the British Empire. The
Canadian people might be willing
to pay tribute once or even twice
to Great Britain, but if the tie
which binds Canada to the Em-
pire were strained too much there
is a serious danger that it might
be broken.

Union Transfer Co. Will Open a
Public Garage and Conduct an
Up-to-Date Repair Shop.

plants of its kind in the north-

Better than Ringing Door-bells

A PIANO manufacturer recently made a house-
to-house canvass. He's one of those men with
an absurd fear of the "waste-circulation" bugaboo
—cannot get away from the haunting thought that
only 10 out of every 100 readers of a newspaper
may be possible buyers of his goods.

So he refused to advertise, and went a-canvassing
—inviting people to come to his piano recitals.
Then he wondered why they didn't come.
