WINNIPEG (P)-A resolution calling for Saturday, closing of all post offices was approved by a vote of 132 to 96 today at the convention of the Postal Employees' Association.

LONDON (Reuters)—Rain fell in most parts of Britain during the night, ending the longest drought on record. After 38 days without measurable rain, London had a steady downpour early today.

WASHINGTON (A)—All 18 members of the joint Congresslonal atomic committee joined Tuesday. In urging that the United States put a nuclear-powered aircraft into flight as soon as possible. Noting that \$800,000,000 already had been spent, the committee said "It is in the national interest to achieve nuclear flight as early as possible, not only to meet stated military requirements, but also to provide a boost to world confidence in America's scientific capability."

BLANTYRE, Nyasaland (Routers)-Claude Ambrese Cardew, 89-year-old ploneor of Central Africa, was found stabbed to death Tuesday at his home in Central Nyasaland. Cardew, one of three surviving members of a column of pioneers who trokked from South Africa to Southern Rhodosia in 1800, was stabbed in the neck and shoulders.
