30mmers appeal dismissed

OTTAWA (CP) — The Supreme Court of Canada today unanimously dismissed the appeal of Robert E. Sommers and H. Wilson Gray, convicted of conspiracy and bribery.

Sommers, 48, former British Columbia minister of lands and forests, and Gray, 46, a Vancouver timber executive, both have been serving five-year terms in Oakalla Penitentlary. In addition, two of Gray's companies were fined a total of \$19,250.

Sommers was found guilty of accepting bribes from Gray. The lumberman was found guilty of paying the bribes in return for favorable treatment in obtaining forest management licences. Their appeal was narrowed to

two points of law: That the charges were laid too late—after a two-year time limit from the date of the alleged offence, and that Sommers was improperly charged as an "official" of the government.

The second ground of appeal, involving the two-year limitation, was rejected by the B.C. Appeal Court on the ground that the old code was repealed before the limitation could have been brought into use.

The Sommers-Gray trial one of the longest in Canadian judiciary history, lasted 82 days with six adjournments. A jury of nine men and three women deliberated 75 hours on two separate occasions after hearing! more than 2,000,000 words of testimony,
