

Tomorrow night is a big night in the boxing world. Tomorrow night takes place at Yankee Stadium the long awaited bout in which World Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson steps into the ring to defend his title against the hot European contender Ingemar Johansson.

Sports writers from coast to coast in the U.S. have made their predictions in many colorful ways, hundreds of Americans have bought up the \$100 ringside seats and both fighters have been training vigorously.

So if the weather holds up it will be a good spectator fight—probably one of the best ever staged in the heavyweight

However, on the other hand, if we were to take Associated Press Staff Writer Murray Rose seriously, tomorrow night's match will be quick-ending and dull.

"Heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson will knock out Sweden's Ingemar Johansson in the first round of an explosive, bloody battle tonight" is what Mr. Rose figures. For Johansson, he says, his only chance appears to

be in his "thunder and lightning" right hand. A big question about Ingo's right that will be answered tonight is whether it can be more powerful than Pete Rademacher's, the boy who floored the champion once.

His right packed enough punch to knack out Eddie Machen in one round and if he can get at Patterson's jaw in a reasonable length of time it will be curtains for the champ. Patterson at that time was said to be afraid of

Is it really true that the champ has a glass jaw? Because he's been knocked to the canvas doesn't mean to say his chin is weak. Other great champs Gene Tunney, Jack Dempsey and Joe Louis have all gone down.

In fact Dempsey was knocked right out of the ring by Luis Firpo in 1923 and Joe Louis got the same treatment from Buddy Baer in 1941.

Patterson, who has fought 35 bouts, won 25 on knockouts, nine on decisions and lost one by decision, is considered a much faster boxer than Johansson, but can he keep out of way of the hard hitting Swede?

Johansson, who has fought 21 bouts, won 13 by knockouts, seven by decision and one on a foul, has a very deadly punch and needs only to use it once to put the champ away. But there are many things against Johansson—this being, only his second fight out of his country—Patterson's past

record for knockouts, the champ's successful training under skillful Cus D'Amato, and the fact that Floyd has wound up on top after being hit by some hard hitting right handers. Patterson yesterday was  $3\frac{1}{2}-1$  favorite to win and 2-1 choice to score a knockout. It was 6-1 odds that Johansson

would not knock out the champ. So if you want to be sure of your bet place it on Patterson. He may hit the canvas once but then again he may come back and knock out the Swede sometime after the

seventh round.

Another big event coming up, but on the local sports scene, is the 220-yard race between Mayor P. J. Lester and Parks Commission chairman Art Murray.

It makes one wonder if this sprint can actually be classified as a sport after all the specifications and clauses they have stressed.

The mayor said today that before the race he's going to demand a saliva test of Murray such as they use on horses to make sure they are not doped. Murray should be in good condition after his four-mile

jaunt around the city's main streets and parks even though he did come in last when he and his two trainers, Bob Anderson and Don Wanamaker ran around Roosevelt Park. "I'm training secretly at 5 o'clock in the mornings—it's

nice and brisk at that time" said the Mayor, "I'm in perfect physical condition.' The odds in Lester's training camp are 3-2 that Murray

won't finish 220 yards. The big argument is where it's going to be held. Murray says he wants it at Roosevelt Park, 1 p.m. July 1. The Mayor says he wants it to take place on Third Avenue
