### ESPIONAGE BY SHIP IN AIR IS RESENTED

**Zeppelin Balloon Obtains Extraordinary Results and Excites London Papers.**

London, Feb. 18.—The frequent sighting of brilliantly lighted and sometimes unilluminated airships flying over different parts of England has at last aroused so much interest that the Daily News, in an editorial, has commented strongly on what is termed a new form of espionage. The article, in declaring that the visits of foreign airships are becoming unpleasantly frequent, says: "It would seem as if these machines are able to elude observation at their pleasure, which fact raises a disquieting doubt whether some of these visitors are not escaping observation altogether."

"This form of espionage," continues the Daily News, "is a grave intrusion, and we have a perfect right to resent it. Our sovereignty goes skyward and down to the centre of the earth. What we now need is legislation with which to assert our rights and aerial police to guard them." Side by side with the editorial published in the Daily News the report of the extraordinary results obtained by the new German Zeppelin balloon is being given much prominence by the London newspapers, especially owing to the fact that Germany now has eighteen military airships and Great Britain has none at all.

### EARLY MORNING MARAUDER

**Drunken Man Disturbs Householders—Takes Possession of Flat on Fourth Ave.**

A phone message was received at the city police station yesterday morning about 3:15 from the residents of a house on Fourth avenue, near Bishop Du Vernet's, that a presumably drunken man had just entered the upper part of the building, which was unoccupied, and was about to make himself comfortable for the night. A good deal of excitement and perturbation must have been occasioned at the untoward event from the tone of the message received at the police station. Constable Adams was immediately despatched to the scene of the outrage and sure enough found a man peacefully reposing. His slumbers for the time being, however, were somewhat disturbed, the constable shaking him into consciousness and insisting that he finish his nap in one of the spacious apartments in the Hotel de Vickers. In the police court it transpired that his name was Jalmar Sallo. He was fined \$10 and costs by Magistrate Carss for being drunk.
