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



# New talks halted as Sinclair blasts cheap propaganda

VANCOUVER (CP)—A meeting between striking fishermen and the British Columbia Fisheries Association broke up late Thursday with an accusation that the fishermen's union was indulging in "cheap, phoney propaganda."

The accusation came from James Sinclair, former Liberal fisheries minister and now president of the fisheries association.


He said the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union (Ind.) presented its original demands with only "trivial changes" after calling a special meeting. The union said earlier its central strike and policy committee asked for the meeting to present revised demands.

There was no immediate prospect of further meetings. The strike in B.C.'s \$90,000,000-a-year the fishing industry involves fishermen, tendermen and cannery workers-9,000 men and women

Mr. Sinclair said the union was still demanding at Thursday's meeting a 14-per-cent increase in the price for sockeye salmon and up to 220 per cent for white spring salmon. It would be "economic suicide" to grant such increases, he said.


