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**FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH**  
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**MILK WAGGON UPSET SLIGHT DAMAGE DONE**  
**Horse Left Standing Started Leisurely Off—Little Jaunt Was Soon Ended.**  
 One of the milk waggon of the Prince Rupert Dairy came to grief about 8:30 this morning in front of the G. T. P. Inn. While Mr. Schafer, the proprietor, was delivering milk to the Premier Hotel the horse started off from where it had been left standing on Centre St. Making too sharp a turn at the corner of the Inn towards Kelly, Douglas & Co.'s, the waggon was completely turned over and the progress of the horse was checked. There was a crashing of glass and a general mix-up of milk bottles and cans. Fortunately, however, there was no one in the waggon and a large quantity of the milk was saved. Frightened by the upsetting of the waggon, the horse made frantic efforts to get away but was finally thrown on its side on the roadway. It was soon released none the worse for the little jaunt brought to such a quick termination. The damage to the waggon consisted of nothing more than broken windows and a broken shaft. The horse was of a quiet disposition and was travelling at a leisurely rate when the upset took place.

**CENSOR FOR MOVING PICTURES**  
**Provincial Officer to Be Appointed to Have Full Charge of Theatres.**  
 Victoria, Feb. 26.—An act to regulate moving picture theatres and to provide for the appointment of a censor of all films used in British Columbia has been introduced by Hon. W. J. Bowser, attorney general. The bill provides that the government shall have power to make regulations governing the construction, lighting and safety of theatres, halls and other buildings erected or used for places of public resort, entertainment or amusement in which a cinematograph or moving picture machine is operated. The government is also given the power to regulate the operation of moving picture machines and to prohibit or regulate films or slides to be exhibited and to prescribe the conditions under which films shall be stored, and providing also for the conditions under which such films shall be exhibited for protection by the censor and fixing the fees to be paid for such inspection.

**POPE'S BROTHER ASKS FOR A RAISE OF PAY**  
**Angelo Sarto Finds His Postmaster's Salary of Fifty Cents a Day Insufficient.**  
 Rome, Feb. 28.—Angel Sarto, 76 years old, a brother of the present Pope fills the humble job of postmaster and letter carrier at Grazia Village, near Mantua, on a salary of fifty cents a day. Finding this insufficient to live upon the Pope's brother travelled to Rome to petition the Italian Post Department for a raise of pay. Through the Parliament deputy from his district Sarto obtained an interview with the postmaster general but failed to obtain an increase of salary. The Government, however, granted him a bonus of \$35 as a recognition of his long service.

**Better than Ringing Door-bells**
